Late Rains Delayed Early Vegetable Crop

Set back by lengthy rains in February, most spring vegetable crops will reach the market two or three weeks late, according to Harold J. Ryan, county agricultural commissioner. Considerable acreages of cantaloupes, beans and squash had to be replanted because seed failed to germinate in cold or wet ground. Truck crops that show acreage increases for the first half of 1944 in Los Angeles county include cauliflower, cantaloupes, sweet corn, cucumbers, lettuce, dry onions and spinach. Decreases are indicated for early tomatoes, carrots and Italian squash. Acreages of strawberries and other kinds of berries are down sharply in this county.



IT PAYS VICTORY GARDENER TO STAKE VINE-LIKE PLANTS

A subject of controversy among vegetable growers is whether trellising pays. Many commercial gardeners feel it does not.

But for the average Victory gardener working a small backyard plot, there exists no rea-



son for failing to trellis vine-like plants. The cost of erecting a sturdy support is nominal; and the work can easily be completed in a few hours.

An important factor in favor of trellising is that it insures clean harvests. The amateur derives great pleasure from picking his own crops at home. If the vegetables are dirty or misshaped, this harvesting job is decreased. Further, a dirty crop always takes more time to prepare it for the table.

When vines grow up in the air, it becomes more difficult for insects to carry on destruction. Snails and worms are surface creepers to a large extent; although they do climb up on the foliage it's much easier for them to eat food right off the ground.

Rains may damage a crop lying on the ground more than one grown on a trellis. An example is the tomato. After a heavy rain, the ground may stay wet for quite some time. That side of the tomato resting on the soil often decays from being in constant contact with the damp earth.

Southern California gardeners should not plant carrots, beets, spinach or other vegetables with the idea of canning. They can be grown the year around. Seasonal vegetables such as sweet corn, string beans, for summer time production; green peas for winter and early spring production, may justify greater planting for preservation. Pressure canning of these kinds is essential. Tomatoes are easily canned, do not need pressure cookers and it's good practice.

Ain't no foolin' 'bout the need for crops, folks, not no way! Yer can bet yer last tin penny that if you don't grow yer own yer ain't going to find as much as last season. Mighty good time right now ter get started. Got our corn in yesterday, some yaller, some white and put it in blocks so 'twould pollinate. Got fooled on that last year. Planted long single rows and the dang stuff didn't have no corn—jist nubbins.

Mighty interesting plant. Has quite a history, corn does. Seems 'twas agrowin' here before the Pilgrims hit Plymouth Rock, but white folks didn't find it 'til 1789 down on the Susquehanna river.

Guess the tall spires of Indian corn waving in the breeze was the first flag of Americy. Got 'nuther flag now, a better one, that the boys are right glad to fight for, but the corn spires, are still needed, so let's raise a heap of 'em. Wal, it's 'bout milkin' time, so guess I'd better be agittin'. Good growin'!

Don't forget those pests! Thrips, which will be developing now on ornamentals and weeds and the remains of your winter garden, are increasing in numbers and will transmit spotted wilt from said weeds and ornamentals to your peppers, tomatoes, etc. Aphids—will find them on most anything from wild oats to roses—will carry various mosaics if you let them. Nicotine sulphate dust or spray is the best all-around control for these two pests, but get after them!

GARDEN GRAMS

Gasoline sufficient for 300 miles may be allotted to victory gardeners for traveling to and from their plots during the 1944 season. To qualify, the gardener must be regularly cultivating an area of at least 1,500 square feet which he visits twice weekly, must share rides if possible, and show that no alternative means of transportation is available. This special Victory garden allotment is covered by Amendment No. 115 to Ration Order 3C and became effective April 6, 1944.

Sowbugs and pillbugs are attracted by sweetened baits and can be controlled by use of a poisoned mash. Broadcast the bait thinly throughout the garden or place in small portions under boards, inverted flower pots filled with straw, or other traps. Formula: 1 pound of dry wheat bran, alfalfa meal, shorts or rice meal mixed dry with 1 ounce of Paris green or arsenic trioxide (white arsenic). Moistened and sweetened with two tablespoons of molasses, honey, corn syrup or heavy sugar syrup and enough water to make a mash suitable for broadcasting. The addition of one or two cups of rice, rye or whole wheat flour, with slight reduction in amount of coarse material,
