## Hauge Seeks Study Of County Juvenile Prisoner Situation

With 87 juveniles now confined in the county jail and with Juvenile Hall exceeding its capacity, County Supervisor Oscar Hauge has requested that a study be made to determine steps to be taken for a permanent solution of the problem. "The county jail is not the proper place to confine juveniles as authorities on this subject agree and the temporary measures soon to be put into effect will not solve the problem," Supervisor Hauge said. "Adequate housing should be provided for these delinquents and this may necessitate a building program as an after-war activity."

Supervisor Hauge stated that in the fiscal year 1938-39 there was an average of 33 juveniles at the county jail. The following year the number was 35, which increased to 43 in 1940. In 1941 there were 52 and last year the number grew to 68. During this period the total number of jail prisoners dropped from 2,214 in 1938-39 to 1,464, the average for the first nine months of the current year.

Juvenile Hall has a capacity of 265 and on a recent date 339 children were confined there. The most recent figure for Juvenile Hall occupation is 299 or 34 over capacity.
