King Opposes WPB's Outlook

"In order for western industry to continue its all-out war production and still safeguard its post-war markets, western

industries should be allowed by the War Production Board to accept contracts for civilian goods with the right to subcontract to eastern firms recon-verted to peace-time operation under the west coast firm brand name," Congressman Cecil R. King, 17th District, told the House of Representatives this week.

"Military authorities concede that the war with Germany will end sooner than the war with Japan, and when it does, war production will be concentrated on the west coast and east coast plants will be permitted to recon-vert. This means that when the victory is won, the Atlantic seaboard will be a year to a year and a half ahead of the west coast and that Southern California in particular, where

More Ways to Use Eggs In Diet

Because of the heaviest egg production on record, necessitating use of more eggs to prevent loss of essential war food, Circular H. D. 168 has been prepared for distribution by the Agricultural Extension Service, University of California, according to Claribel Nye, state home demonstration leader.

The circular lists 72 ways of preparing eggs and discusses their digestibility, their importance in the diet, and their vitamin content. It was prepared by Hilda Faust, extension specialist in nutrition. "The purpose of these directions is to increase the attractiveness of the food in flavor, appearance and texture; to maintain digestibility; to save time, energy and important food materials; to present the place of eggs in the diet," Miss Faust says of her work.

The circular is available, without cost, from the Agricultural Extension Service, University of California, Berkeley 4, or from county home demonstration agents.

Hauge Outlines Service Record To This District

Steadily increasing strength in his campaign for re-election is reported by County Supervisor Oscar Hauge, who represents the Fourth District on the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Hauge is basing his campaign on his record in office, his reputation for honesty, fairness and economy. Throughout the time he has served his district, Dr. Hauge has fought for reduced tax rate. In this endeavor he has been successful, the county tax rate being lowered each year for the past five years.

With nearly all of Los Angeles county's shoreline within his district, Supervisor Hauge is thoroughly conversant with beach problems. He has been a strong advocate of public ownership of beaches and was the first to advocate a master plan of shoreline development.

Marked savings in county expenditures were brought about by a proposal advocated by Supervisor Hauge. This was the elimination of an expenditure of more than \$40,000 annually on fire insurance premiums carried on the county's fireproof structures.

Supervisor Hauge also advocated a fair allotment of gasoline tax funds to cities of the county based upon a population and street mileage basis. This has been brought into being and has received approval of all cities in the county.

Through efforts of Supervisor Hauge more than \$4,000,000 of county funds has been expended for the rehabilitation of tax delinquent property in the Fourth District through the refinancing under county direction of special assessment districts.

Opposes Hearst

Valuable support to Supervisor Hauge's candidacy was gained through his recent opposition of the proposal of the Hearst Sun-Val Land and Packing Corporation to unload 16,420 feet of shoreline on the county which was totally unfit for recreational development. Although this gained him the enmity of special interests seeking to sell this property, his action won him the support of taxpayers who would be called upon to foot the bill. Supervisor Hauge's stand in this matter was supported and based upon views of the County Department of Recreation and the Department of Parks.

Persons interested in the welfare of the aged are supporting Supervisor Hauge because of his fairness in dealing with the county's aged aid program, he having taken a fair and sensible attitude in this activity.

Knowing that in the after-war period thousands of returned servicemen as well as civilians will be seeking employment, Supervisor Hauge has been a leader in the county's effort to prepare post-war construction projects in advance so that they can be quickly instituted when the time comes.

Further service to taxpayers on the part of Supervisor Hauge is now in progress in his endeavor to further decentralize county government so that residents of the county will not be compelled to travel long dis-
