WAVES IN SUMMER SEERSUCKER

Cool and happy are Ensign Eloise English of Washington, D. C. left, and Virginia Laws, Yeoman, third class, of Denver, Colorado, in their new summer uniforms.

The uniforms are gray and white pinstriped seersucker, consisting of jacket and one-piece shirtwaist dress having a round collar, set-in belt at the waist, and a single kick-pleat in front. They are identical for officers and enlisted women, except for the insignia of rank or rating, ties, shoes, purse and gloves are black. The cost of these summer uniforms is covered by part of the Navy clothing allowance—\$200 for enlisted WAVES, \$250 for officers. Women may apply for the WAVES at Navy Recruiting Stations or Offices of Naval Officer Procurement.

Sewage Disposal Plant Subject Of C. of C. Meet

Proposed sewage disposal plans for the Metropolitan area, a post-war project designed to protect beach recreational areas, will be one of the major subjects of discussion before the natural resources committee of the Southern Council, California State Chamber of Commerce, meeting at the Biltmore Hotel today. Leaders of this discussion will be Lloyd Aldrich, City Engineer of Los Angeles, and Dr. Elmer Bell, President, State Board of Public Health.

Leo Carrillo, Member of the State Park Commission, will attend the session to present policies of the State concerning beach acquisition for public use, and his remarks will be supplemented by A. E. Henning, Chief of the State Division of Parks.

Viewpoints of Los Angeles, Ventura, San Bernardino, San Diego and other counties concerning the new Omnibus Flood Control Bill, now before Congress, will be presented to the committee by local leaders, and the upstream phases of flood control will be presented by William V. Mendenhall, Supervisor of the Angeles National Forest.

J. H. Howard, General Counsel, Metropolitan Water District, will report on the status of the controversy relating to allocation of Colorado River water. Paul Bailey, of Santa Ana, will preside.

Council committees on agriculture, industry, transportation and highways, taxation, natural resources, and social security, will convene at 9:30 a. m. Asa V. Call, of Los Angeles, newly appointed Regional Vice-President of the State Chamber, will be presented to the Council, at luncheon, by Hal G. Hotchkiss, of San Diego, State Chamber director and retiring regional chairman.

Torrance Gas Rations Not Being Changed

Torrance is not a part of the OPA gasoline rations issuance center being conducted for 41 local boards in Los Angeles, but may eventually participate in a central office in Long Beach, according to Frank Daniels, chief clerk of the Torrance local War Price and Ration board.

The problems of issuance which have been experienced in other larger communities have not bothered Torrance, Daniels explained.

The area to which books are now being mailed from the Los Angeles issuance center include: Los Angeles, Hollywood, Glendale, Pasadena, Alhambra, East Los Angeles, Montebello, Maywood, Huntington Park, South Gate, Lynwood, Compton, Gardena, Athens, Culver City and Beverly Hills.

The issuance center, located in a building equipped with adequate safekeeping facilities, will only handle the mechanical issuance of books.

This new procedure will not in any way affect the individual motorists. All applications for gasoline rations will continue to be received only by the local boards. The local boards retain all their powers to approve or reject applications.

Establishment of the Los Angeles central issuance center, Balthis said, is designed to aid safeguarding of gasoline coupons. It is expected to increase efficiency of the boards by relieving them of such tasks as tailoring, mailing and disposal of voided coupons, eliminate distribution of books to the local boards, and relieve them of some bookkeeping detail work.

Poultry Man Out of Business For Overcharges

Admitted repeated violations of price ceilings on live poultry committed while he was on probation following sentence on similar violations last year, today had put Loren C. Bliss, Jr., of 1376 Willow Street, Los Angeles, out of the poultry business.

U. S. District Judge Ralph E. Jenney sentenced Bliss to pay a fine of \$3,500 and placed him on probation for five years, with one condition of the probation being that he cease all operations in the poultry business.

TRUCKS SET MARK

Fats Collection Declines 50,000 Pounds in South

Fats collected from Torrance during the month of April and converted into making of munitions, reached a total of 2,734 pounds, according to figures from the War Production board.

Lomita turned in 1,808 pounds and Harbor City 406 pounds.

Loss of 50,000 pounds of waste fats that might have been saved for war industry, but presumably disappeared into garbage cans or down kitchen sinks, was deplored by Zack J. Farmer, general salvage chief of the War Production Board in Los Angeles.

The missing 50,000 pounds were represented by an equivalent decline in April salvage totals for southern California, as compared with the preceding month.

Southern California housewives collected 919,503 pounds of kitchen grease, as compared with 970,426 pounds in March, WPB figures revealed.

"We could well expect a little difficulty in maintaining the high mark set in March," Farmer commented, "but with virtually all kinds of meat now point-free, housewives can serve more meat than ever before since rationing started. We ought to be getting a corresponding amount of salvaged grease."

Word just received from Washington indicated that the U. S. still lacks enough inedible fats for production of pharmaceuticals, synthetic rubber, paints, explosives, soap, lubricants and other productions, Farmer declared.

Collections during the first quarter nationally averaged about 15,000,000 pounds a month—twice the rate prevailing at the end of 1943, the Washington statement said. Even so, they must be stepped up further.

Last year 90,000,000 pounds were salvaged. In 1944 we need 230,000,000 pounds.

Japan still holds lands in the Far East that formerly sent us more than a billion pounds of inedible fats a year. This loss, plus war demands, have upset the balance and caused a deficit of industrial fats. Our main hope of getting back into balance lies in a further increase in household collections.

Mrs. I. W. Snow Wants Mothers To Get Together
