**Through Service**  
Gardena lines now extend to the yellow car lines at Vermont and Broadway. The Torrance service would extend on Western to Slauson, then east to Main street and then to the Torrance terminal on Hill street. Through service fare of 25 cents from Gardena is proposed. At present Gardena residents are paying 10 cents on their local bus, then transferring to a yellow car, where an additional 10 cents—in addition to the waiting and slow service of the street cars involved—is paid.

Torrance fares would remain the same, as at present contemplated.

Gardena has eight buses, Torrance six, with six more new vehicles coming. This would give the combined service a total of 20 buses for local and interurban service.

Santa Monica city's highly successful municipal bus line and its terminals are being studied by local authorities for ideas in connection with the expansion.

It is hoped that the deal with Gardena may be consummated within the next week or ten days and that the whole combined system may be in operation within a few weeks.

The system not only will be a boon to local business men and industrial establishments, but to the residents of Torrance, Gardena and other communities.

**MORGENTHAU DUE IN L.A. FOR RALLY**



Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., will make two public appearances in Los Angeles Wednesday, June 14, in the interest of the Fifth War Loan drive.

Arriving by plane from Texas, Morgenthau will officiate Monday on a nationally broadcast "Civilian D-Day" program opening the campaign, Morgenthau will have a full schedule.

Visits to war plants and conferences with Southern California Treasury officials are planned, in addition to an address at a noon luncheon and his main speech in the evening at Hollywood Bowl.

The luncheon is being sponsored in the Secretary's honor at the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce at the Biltmore Bowl.

Thousands of Fifth War Loan volunteer workers will be special guests at the Hollywood Bowl affair, which starts at 8 p.m. The program will be opened by Lt. Rudy Vallee and the 11th Naval District Coast Guard Band. Morgenthau's address, which will be broadcast nationally, will follow at 8:30, and an entertainment program, in which Hollywood celebrities will participate, starts at 9 p.m. Bob Hope will be master of ceremonies. Others taking part will include Bette Davis, Bing Crosby, Judy Garland and Jose Iturbi.

Tickets for the latter affair are being distributed to the various volunteer groups by the Treasury War Finance Committee, it was announced.

outstanding oilfields of California," stated W. E. Waste, general manager of Maranship. "When these 24 ships, powered by their sturdy 8250-horsepower turbo-electric motors, are completed and in use on the seven seas they will form a dramatic tribute to the California petroleum industry and its men and women."

**Second Ship**  
Plans call for the laying of keel for S. S. Elk Hills, second Hill class ship, about July 30, with subsequent keel layings, launchings and deliveries following at the rate of at least three a month.

The Maranship tankers are more than 525 feet long, of 16,500 deadweight tons, and are designed for long permanent service on important petroleum trade routes during war and peace.

The gasoline delivered to our fighting fronts by a single one of these tankers would send 1,000 four-engine bombers on six roundtrip bombing missions to Berlin from British bases, according to company statisticians. It was pointed out that this is believed to be the first time in history that a series of important tanker ships has been named for oil producing areas of the state.

Names of all ships in the Hill class, to be built at Maranship between now and May, 1945, in order, are: Kettleman Hills, Elk Hills, Lost Hills, Antelope Hills, Buena Vista Hills, Coalinga Hills, Montebello Hills, Inglewood Hills, Baldwin Hills, McKittrick Hills, Newhall Hills, Rincon Hills.

Potrero Hills, Sunset Hills, Midway Hills, Whittier Hills, Signal Hills, Ventura Hills, Puente Hills, La Brea Hills, Santa Maria Hills, Kern Hills, Elwood Hills and Torrance Hills.

**Cares for Buildings**  
Burns remarked that the USO had a good reputation for turning back buildings in better condition than they found them, as they often make improvements to suit their requirements. The USO carries liability insurance and insurance on furniture, also pays utilities. They have a regular lease form to be signed, reserving the right to cancel the lease upon 60 days' written notice, the lease term to be for one year, renewable at the end of the year.

With reference to refreshments to be served at the USO, Burns suggested that something could be allowed in the budget for refreshments, such as coffee and doughnuts for "coffee hours," but it is not their policy to go in too much for food. Concerning books and magazines, Burns said these could be readily obtained by appealing to the community for donations.
