Rev. Roloff Reappointed To Pastorate

The 61st sessions of the California annual conference of the Evangelical church ended Sunday in Sacramento.

In the annual appointment of pastors to the churches, Rev. H. Wesley Roloff was returned to the Torrance church for his fifth year of service.

At these conference sessions there were two retirements, Rev. J. V. Knoll from the Point Pleasant church and Rev. E. L. Weatherwax from the Burbank church. Three young men entered the work of the California conference, including each of them served very successful pastorates in other conferences. Rev. E. V. Wright, coming from the Oregon-Washington conference, was appointed to the Melrose church, Los Angeles. Rev. Walter Bishoff of the Illinois conference, was assigned to the Burbank church and Rev. Byron Chapman of the Indiana conference takes the pastorate of the Porterville church.

The local church was taken from the mission list and now becomes a self-supporting charge. The conference spoke highly of the gains made in the local church. In the past two and one-half years the church undertook a major rebuilding program. This obligation, in addition to older obligations, has been paid in full. In addition to a greatly expanded budget, the local church, which was receiving \$900 a year missionary aid in 1940, now is debt-free and self-supporting.

Sunday morning Bishop C. H. Stauffacher presided at the ordination of five young men as deacons. Rev. H. Wesley Roloff was advanced to the order of elder, which is the highest ministerial order of the Evangelical church.

Torrance Kiwanians were taken on a 10-mile hike Monday night—through the 35-acre plant of the National Supply Company—on a tour arranged by Dr. R. F. Bishop, through his cooperation with Jack Morgan of National Supply.

They saw how the firm turns out 40,000 tons of high grade steel per year from recovered scrap material, and how 2,700 employees earn \$3000 per hour doing the job. The plant spends \$10,000 an hour for materials, they were told.

Seventy-two different crafts manufacture most of the steel into war materials in the big plant. The company has plants in Springfield, Houston and in England, although each is operated independently.
