MORE CANNING URGED IN FACE OF RATIONING

When the War Food Administration says "present estimates of civilian supplies indicate the restoration of point values on a number of canned vegetables, and civilian supply of canned fruits will be less than the low level of the current year," homemakers should take the cue and can more this summer, according to Charibel Nye, state home demonstration leader of the Agricultural Extension Service, University of California.

"These estimates of the WFA should make housewives aware that the present point holiday on canned vegetables is only temporary," Miss Nye said. "Civilian supply of the principal canned vegetables is expected to be 20 percent smaller than last year, and the supply of vegetable juices 15 percent less. Point values were removed from most canned vegetables because the 1943 supply was sufficient to last until the new pack, and because it would help to clear shelves and warehouses for the new crops.

"War requirements for vegetables are 70 percent higher. Government services will take over half the 1944 pack of canned fruits, and civilian demand will be far greater than the available supply."

Mental Screening Will Continue

Lt. M. L. Sale of the Civil Air Patrol announced today that his unit was prepared to continue mental screening tests and assist successful boys in making application for enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve. As of June 6, enlistment was again opened to qualified young Americans in order to insure a sufficient number of eligible individuals for training this fall. Upon passing the preliminary qualifying physical and mental tests, he will become a member of the U. S. Army Air Forces—on inactive duty. This means that he will not be called for training until he has reached his 18th birthday. If he is at work he may remain on the job until he is 18. If he is in high school, he may elect to finish the semester he is in when he becomes 18. If he is a high school graduate, not over 17 years and nine months, he may elect to take advantage of the Army Specialized Training Reserve program, which provides free college training for men approaching military age.

The Civil Air Patrol continues to provide preliminary training in basic military subjects to enlistees so that they can enter actual cadet courses equipped with the advantage of this extra preparatory time.
