HIGHWAY GROUPS WILL MERGE AS RESULT OF MEETING HELD IN TORRANCE MONDAY NIGHT

Amalgamation of the inactive Southwest District Highways Association with the South Bay Beach and Highway Association, which met in Torrance Monday night, probably will be accomplished at the next meeting of the groups. This announcement was made by Oscar Willett, president of the South Bay Beach and Highway Association, following a conference with Sam Hill, president, and Ray Mowry, secretary, of the Southwest District, Monday night. Hill and Willett decided that the interests of their districts could best be served by a consolidation of forces, and it was decided that the next general meetings of the two groups would be held jointly in August, at which time the amalgamation proposal would be submitted to the membership. At the meeting Monday, President Willett outlined briefly the purpose of the organization for the benefit of Torrance visitors who were not acquainted with the work of the organization. He stated that the association was formed at the request of the mayors and city councils of all the beach communities in the South Bay District, to approach and solve the many beach and highway problems confronting the area, not as individual cities, but rather as one unit. President Willett dwelt briefly on the efforts of the association in connection with lifting the ban on bathing in quarantined areas and the hoped for early correction of the pollution situation. The association is sponsoring a plan to turn all South Bay waterfront sections into state park supervision, via municipal ownership, according to Willett. Mr. State Group. The board of directors of the association met with the highway committee of the California State Chamber of Commerce recently to discuss the allocation of the 82 millions of dollars appropriated by the legislature for highways in California. The recommendations of the association were endorsed by the State Chamber and submitted to the State Legislature for approval as postwar projects. Election of officers and directors will be held at the August meeting. Ernest East, veteran highway engineer with the State Department of Highways, was the principal speaker Monday. He stressed that highways were the function of the people. He pictured the development of the highway system and network of freeways over the past fifty years in California, illustrating this growth by the use of maps and graphic charts. Mr. East has watched this steady growth from the mule team form of transportation to the present automotive transportation serving millions in this state who prefer this mode over proposed rapid transit. He anticipated that the highways in the State of California would accommodate approximately 39 million people after the war. Workers in all classifications will prefer to remain in Southern California after cessation of hostilities and large numbers of out-of-state veterans are already migrating to California to live and work. We in this ideal section of the state will develop an immense trade to South and Central America and the Orient, added East, and the opportunities for the Harbor area are unlimited if we take advantage of the opportunity presented. East illustrated the trend of population in Los Angeles county and showed how the metropolitan area was dwindling in favor of urban and suburban interest. East pointed out that a network of "limited access highways," or "freeways," served the entire state was the only solution to efficiently accommodate the increasing population and the diverting population moving to various sections of the county and state. These so-called freeways would not have any railroad crossings and ex-

Used Car Sales Subject to OPA Review

Every sale of a used car will be carefully scrutinized by OPA's war price and ration boards when the price ceiling regulation goes into effect starting July 10, it has been announced by F. W. Daniels, chief clerk of the local War Ration Board in Torrance. "Copies of the regulation which lists the maximum price for all makes and models of used passenger automobiles have been fully distributed," Daniels said. "Not only have all boards been instructed as to the used car sales regulation, but copies of the regulation are now in the hands of all southland dealers. In addition the 60 branches of the Southern California Auto Club have copies of the regulation and will assist with pricing information." The right of the public to use OPA's "treble damage" action against dealers who charge more than the ceiling price will be the major enforcement weapon of the used car price regulation, which goes into effect July 10.

Woman Cited for Drunk Driving After Crash
