Sportsmen May Be Able to Get More Ammunition

A recent communication to George P. Miller of the California Division of Fish and Game, from C. N. Feast of Colorado and president of the Western Association of State Game and Fish Commissioners, gives hope that sportsmen will be able to obtain a limited supply of ammunition this year.

According to Mr. Feast, present plans call for a per person allotment of 40 to 50 center fire cartridges, 100 shot shells and 200 .22 caliber rimfire shells. Ammunition manufacturers expect this ammunition will be made available to ammunition dealers for early hunting.

Plan Now for Fall, Winter Gardening

Let's get right down and talk serious "turkey" about the fall garden situation!

Every time a new moon rises on the Horizons of Victory, and there are several moons now with Germany showing signs of internal turmoil, advances on the Normandy front, the Russian front, South Pacific front—every front, the tendency is for people's optimism to rise to the surface, bubble over and kill all the work ambition and self-sacrifice determination which is necessary to win this war.

If every nation in the world laid down pistols, stopped flying warplanes, tied up navies, and shut off the radar tomorrow there would still be a plenty big food shortage through 1945 and maybe 1946. During the period of readjustment it will take as much food to keep the human machines going as during the war. Wages will probably remain high and purchasing power great. Therefore, per capita consumption of food will doubtless remain at the present levels.

Add to this domestic picture the increasingly obvious need to feed starving populations in Europe until they can reestablish their own production. European countries certainly cannot be producing before the fall of 1945 with the possible exception of those areas retaken by Russia in mid-summer. Land captured after mid-summer cannot be planted.

All this comes right back down the assembly line to your Victory garden and to its part in producing the six hundred million pounds of fresh vegetables raised in California gardens last year and to its part in the sixteen billion pounds produced in the country as a whole. We must all keep it up!

Winter Gardening
The inertia of a warm day plus the fact that spading and land preparation are the first steps of a winter garden make the actual start, which of course must come during hot August and early September, harder than the spring garden.

After the start, however, the fall garden, growing along into the winter, will actually require less attention and will give you fresh vegetables high in vita-

mins at a season when they are normally scarce.

Of course, the first step in a fall garden is fertilization. The ground presumably will have been used once this season. Apply about a sack of well pulverized cow manure to 100 square feet of area, work it down, and spade it in. Plant the seed or set out the plants about two weeks after this fertilization.

Layout of the fall garden is particularly important. Why? Because it will rain before you are through with it, you've got drainage to think of. You don't want to sluice the water off and neither do you want the plants drowned out. So put your furrows on a slight grade which will just carry the water to the end of the furrow between the rows. Plan to grow winter vegetables on raised beds three to five inches high.

Planting Seed
Give particular attention to germinating the seed you plant. Sow it in fully moist soil. Cover the seed with muslin, burlap or newspaper until the seed sprouts and nears the surface of the soil. Dried grass cuttings can be used for a mulch. Irrigation will need to be frequent but light in order to keep young plants growing, and

Lowly Rat Comes In for Publicity

The lowly and despised rat is the object of a battle cry raised today by the County Health Department. It is well known that the rat is not only destructive but is also the carrier of numerous diseases, including the dread typhus and plague. Yet trash piles continue to exist for his convenient nesting place and food is left where he may easily reach it. The slicker is, as usual, the rat—the sucker is the human.

In the course of cleaning up the yard for the summer season, elimination of the trash pile will do much to discourage rat breeding. And don't neglect the adjoining vacant lot. Health Department officials add. Plug the holes that permit him to get in or under the house and protect food in storage by using rat-proof containers. Let's cooperate against the rat.

Crops to Be Planted
Carrots, beets, turnips, parsnips, radishes, chard, spinach and both leaf and head lettuce—these are all good fall crops for which seed can be planted. Four or five inch high plants of winter cabbage and broccoli should be purchased at your nursery supply house.

Onion seed can be planted during September—in fact, onion sets can be planted at any time for green onions. During late August and early September planting of garden peas is in order. Use an early variety so they will mature before frost. Delay your second planting until December or January so that plants will be growing during cold weather and blossom will come after frost.

In warmer sections of Los Angeles county it is still feasible to put in a late planting of snap beans, probably bush type would be better, and summer squash. In many cases far better quality vegetables can be grown during the fall and winter than in spring and summer. Insects are more numerous in warm weather. Garden Grams

Success with head lettuce grown as a fall crop depends upon the season and selecting the best planting dates, particularly in the interior valleys. In central and northern California seed this crop in mid-August; in southern California sow in September and in Coachella and Imperial valleys sow in October. Leaf lettuce, which is generally more satisfactory than head lettuce for home gardens, may be sown later. Lettuce may be transplanted directly if it is simpler to seed into the garden. Transplanting three to four inch plants into the garden should be done three to four weeks later than the above recommended seeding dates. Extended periods of high temperatures may prevent germination under such conditions may be obtained by placing seed in a thin layer between moist cloth in a refrigerator for four to six days before planting. Keep soil moist at all times until seeds have germinated.

Judging Melons
Maturity of cantaloupes is well indicated by the appearance of a crack at the point where the stem is attached to the fruit. The melon should not be harvested before this crack completely encircles the stem attachment, the so-called "full slip" stage, at which time a light tug will pull the stem free from the melon. Cantaloupes usually develop a strong flavor if allowed to lie in the garden long after they have reached this stage. The Japanese melon, Persian, Casaba and Cranshaw, from which melons the stem does not separate readily at any stage, develop a yellowish color and become somewhat soft at the blossom end when approaching maturity. Judging the ripeness of watermelons is more difficult, requiring considerable experience. When rapped with the knuckles early in the morning, a ripe watermelon usually resounds with a dull sound whereas a green melon produces a light or hollow sound.

Melons are of best quality when harvested early in the morning because they are more turgid at that time. If melons are not to be used immediately they should be stored in an icebox at 40 degrees F.

Grape Jam Is Not Rationed

Those who enjoy grape jam, tomato preserves or tomato marmalades can now purchase them at point free. In the same action this week, OPA restored point values on canned corn to aid in stretching short supplies until the new supplies come in in mid-September. Five points are now needed to purchase the 20-ounce No. 2 can and three points for whole kernel, vacuum packed 12-ounce can.

Setting an all-time high war financing drive record for this area, Southland citizens bought \$580,690,000 in bonds during the Fifth War Loan campaign.

This figure was made public by Robert H. Moulton, chairman of the Treasury War Finance Committee for Southern California, following tabulation of sales reports up to the deadline hour of midnight, July 31.

The 11-county area exceeded its overall objective by \$68,690,000, or 13 percent above the quota, and rolled up a total of \$91,690,000 greater than that attained in the Fourth War Loan drive, which itself had set a new high record.

While Fifth War Loan purchases reached \$222,630,000, against \$215,000,000 in the Fourth War Loan drive, Southern Californians fell slightly short of the goal assigned to them in this one category.

Corporations subscribed 135 percent of their quota, buying a total of \$368,060,000 in bonds. Moulton pointed out that the overall Fifth loan quota of \$512,000,000 for this territory was \$76,000,000 more than that of the previous drive.

"But the fact that this failed to daunt our army of volunteer workers and the general public is something we are proud of," he said. "It was a tremendous assignment, yet again Southern California has proven that it can be depended upon to do its share and more in 'backing the attack!'"

Speaking for the Treasury War Finance Committee, Moulton lauded the various county community and group chairmen and those working with them the payroll plan committees; the house-to-house canvassers and the thousands of others who helped to make the drive a success.
