DEED FOR NEW CITY PARK IS TRANSMITTED TO CITY COUNCIL FOR ACCEPTANCE

Torrance's new park, in Hollywood Riviera section, becomes a reality this week, the Torrance Chamber of Commerce having handed the City Council a deed to nine acres of property presented by W. Vaughn Scott, prominent realty man and civic leader of this area, and the council having indicated that it will accept the land and improve the area as requested.

The property probably will be set aside as a Boy Scout camp for Harbor District and Centinela Valley. Boy Scouts and named for Scott, who arranged the donation of the land.

Transmitting the deed to the land, Harry B. Lewis, executive secretary, Torrance Chamber of Commerce, said that the deed is made to the City of Torrance on the understanding the land will be used for park purposes "exclusively."

Not Limited
"We have placed this last word in quotations, owing to the difference in legal definitions between the word 'exclusively' and the word 'only.' According to the best authorities, the use of the phrase 'park purposes exclusively' does not limit the use as would the word 'only.'"

The Chamber's letter continues: "The foregoing is in accordance with conversations with Mr. W. Vaughn Scott, president of the Redondo Beach Chamber of Commerce, through whom the negotiations for the sites were mediated. It has been his thought for a number of years to find a suitable tract of land to be utilized as a Boy Scouts camp for this general area. Mr. Scott is vice chairman for the

Centinela Valley District of Boy Scouts and the undersigned is vice chairman for the Harbor District of Boy Scouts, and we both felt that we should suggest and recommend that the larger piece of land be used for the Boy Scouts camp and the two smaller sites used as outposts or assigned as city parks, whichever your honorable body preferred.

"It seems to us that the parcel of land in question was just made for the purposes recommended, and the Hollywood Riviera Improvement Association would be very happy if the City Council of the City of Torrance will accept the property and direct it for the good of the youths.

"The above property is described as follows, marked on attached map: Lot 50, Block "P," Tract No. 10300; Lot 1, Block "M," Tract No. 10302, Lot 1, Block "G," Tract No. 10304.

"May we learn your pleasure in the premises at an early date to enable us to make formal application for a full-time activities director and caretaker, et cetera."

Preference Given Returned Veterans

Preference is given veterans of World War II in hiring personnel at the Los Angeles Port of Embarkation. At present, 63 of these discharged veterans are employed at the Port in 19 different types of work, LAPE personnel officials report.

Sixty of these veterans are men and three are women—one a former WAVE. Their jobs range from laborers to that of chief of the safety branch, Charles W. Headley, discharged Sept. 19, 1943, from an armored division.

Utility Beef Is Cheaper Than Regular Cuts

Housewives find utility beef and utility lamb, which became point free on Sunday, Aug. 13, selling for as much as 20 cents a pound less on some cuts than of the same cuts of the top grades of beef or lamb, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

In making C or utility grade beef and lamb ration point free, effective last Sunday, OPA also put point values again on certain pork items and canned fish.

Pork steaks, chops, loin roasts and ham and Canadian bacon went back on points, ranging from 2 to 9 points a pound, due to a seasonal shortage and heavy military purchases.

Canned fish also went back, with a 2 to 8 point range, and most cheeses are on the list at from 6 to 12 points a pound.

Utility (or grade C) beef is meat which comes from grass-fed cattle who have been given little or no concentrated grain.

The meat is easily distinguishable by an attached thin layer of yellow, butter-color fat.

When sold in retail stores this grade of meat must be plainly marked either with a C or utility stamp, or be posted in the show-case or tray as "utility."

Utility beef is just as nutritious as high quality beef and has similar elements of protein, calcium and vitamins. However, it is not so tender nor as flavorful, and therefore requires more care in cooking.

1,200 STUDENTS EXPECTED AT TORRANCE HIGH SCHOOL AS YEAR OPENS SEPT. 5

Torrance High school had an enrollment of 1040 on the closing day of school, an increase of 167 over the total for the preceding June, and on the opening of the new term on September 5 is expected to have near 1,200 students.

Crowded conditions will prevail at the school as the year opens, it is indicated, as there is no hope of completing the remodeling of the Science building by September 5, it is reported at the school.

The 12 large classrooms of the Science building would provide space for upwards of 400 students, and it may be early October before the structure is completed.

The state's apportionment to the Torrance High school's operation for the year just closed was \$87.95 for each pupil, average daily attendance for the year.

While the 1,040 enrollment at the end of the year does not represent the average, being somewhat higher than the a.d.a., on the basis of this figure, the state aid would amount to \$91,468.00. This is in addition to the taxes levied by the Los Angeles City school district for the high schools of the entire city.

Much of this money is spent on other high schools of the city of Los Angeles, and the same is true of the state fund.

Big Apportionment
The state's apportionment to the Los Angeles City high school district amounted to \$6,573,931 for 1943-44, an average of \$87.95 for each of the 74,732 pupils in average daily attendance in the district for 1942-43, California Taxpayers' association reported today, making public its analysis of state aids to high school districts throughout California.

Total state aid to all the high school districts in Los Angeles county for 1943-44 was \$11,502,399, based on 129,114 pupils in average daily attendance for the preceding year, the association found.

In addition to state aid, the secondary as well as the elementary school districts may levy taxes on the property in the districts, the Taxpayers' organization stated. Maximum property tax rate for separate high school districts is 75 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation for high school purposes or \$1.00 for high schools conducting junior college classes.

State aid to the high school districts in California totaled \$30,030,608 for 1943-44, or an average of \$92.67 for each of the 324,073 pupils in average daily attendance in the high schools throughout the state. This is only part of the \$78,914,722 which the people of the state


