

Blue Points Doubled In Value

New point values for processed foods still rationed, effective at 12:01 a. m. Sunday, Sept. 17, are approximately double their former values, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

These new point values, which will be used until the end of the rationing period on Sept. 30, apply to canned and bottled fruits, four fruit and vegetable juices, canned tomatoes, catsup and chili sauce.

Higher point values for items which are still rationed is necessary, OPA said, because of sharply increased point buying power in the hands of housewives resulting from the removal from rationing of many processed foods.


For example of the higher point values, peaches, pears and pineapple, which had an old point value of 43 points for a No. 2 1/2 can, have been increased to 80 points per can. Pineapple juice was increased from 25 to 50 points for the No. 2 (18-oz.) can. However, tomatoes, which had a value of 5 points for a No. 2 can, were increased to 20 points.

"This point increase does not reflect a sudden change in the supply picture," said Price Administrator Chester Bowles.

"What they do reflect is the unavailability of nearly all vegetables, special products, and all fruit spreads, effective Sept. 17, as requested by the War Food Administration. The supply of these processed foods still rationed remains about the same.

"Five stamps for the September rationing period were already valid for 10 points each when OPA was advised to stop rationing the items which will be removed from the processed foods program Sept. 17, so the number of stamps cannot be reduced at this time.

"So we increased the point values, setting them in multiples of 10 and retired the blue tokens. From Sept. 17 to Sept. 30,

Restrictions On Lumber Sales Are Relaxed

Relaxed restrictions on certain types of lumber have now been worked out to make it available for civilian consumers without the necessity of securing a WPB preference rating from the Federal Housing Administration, John E. McGovern, director of Southern California district, said today.

A new WPB order permits all lumber dealers to sell to "all other consumers" for maintenance and repair purposes up to one-third of their stock on hand as of Sept. 1 between now and Dec. 31, without the necessity of purchasers applying to FHA for a WPB priority.

Only in the event the consumer is unable to obtain the lumber he needs should application be made to the FHA for a preference rating which, under WPB regulations, it can issue only for emergency repairs.

In general, emergency ratings are justified only when a house is rendered unfit for continued occupancy through damage by fire, flood, tornado, earthquake, storm or a similar catastrophe.

The sale by dealers of one-third of their inventory during the current quarter is in addition to the 5,000 to 8,000 feet per quarter that each is allowed. The release of this lumber without priorities will go a long way in relieving the situation that existed.


Money Put Up For Purchase Of New Park
