Torrance USO Committee Given Certificate of Recognition

Torrance U.S.O. committee has been given a "certificate of recognition" that it is the "official U.S.O. committee in Torrance, Calif., and is authorized to conduct U.S.O. services in conformity with the policies and regulations prescribed and to be prescribed by the President and the board of directors of the United Service Organizations, Inc."

The certificate, received by Charles Z. Ward, chairman, from Robert Wayne Burns, regional executive, was signed by Chester I. Barnard, president of U.S.O., Inc.

"It is a real pleasure to provide a pat-on-the-back for you and your associates of the U.S.O. committee in the form of a 'certificate of recognition,'" Burns told Ward. More Money for Dependent Young Is Being Asked

Nine times as much federal money has gone to the state of California for old-age assistance as for aid to dependent children during the past three years under the Social Security Act, according to Richard M. Neustadt, regional director of the Social Security Board. Federal grants for old-age assistance totaled \$71,280,000, but only \$7,992,000 went for aid to dependent children.

In June of this year only 17,296 dependent children received assistance as against 157,605 aged persons. Throughout the nation less than 2 per cent of the children receive state-federal public assistance as compared to 22 per cent of the aged.

These figures represent, in part, a difference in the extent of need among the two groups. Primarily, however, they reflect the under-development of the aid to dependent children program.

The federal government and the state of California share responsibility for providing adequate assistance to California's dependent children. The federal matching maximums on monthly assistance payments for children are \$18 for the first child and \$12 for every other eligible child in the same home and such payments may have to meet the needs of the mother as well as the child. On the other hand, the maximum on monthly payments for the aged person is \$40.

To pave the way for more help to children, the Social Security Board has recommended to Congress, as part of the duties imposed upon it by the terms of the act, that states be encouraged to remove their maximums so that need as determined can be met.

The Social Security Board has further recommended extension of coverage under the aid to dependent children program to all needy children living in family homes. All needy persons 65 years of age and over, except those in public institutions, are eligible for assistance under the federal act, but the board estimates that not more than one-eighth of the child population can be helped under terms of the act. At present only children in need because of death, absence or illness of a parent are eligible for aid.
