"Folding of seals started Oct. 1 and since that time more than 250 women and girls have volunteered to help us. "I want to express my deep appreciation to Mrs. Ida Baker and the War Council for organizational aid and to the Red Cross, the Business and Professional Women's Club, the Campfire Girls, and the Girl Scouts," he said. The 1944 Christmas seal of "The Jolly Postman" will be mailed to Los Angeles County residents when the 38th annual seal sale opens Nov. 20.

MacDonnell Back at Chamber Job

Pat MacDonnell, who had offices in Torrance for months as manager of the war housing area, Nov. 1 will resume his duties as secretary of the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce, from which position he was given leave of absence in order to serve in the federal government post. He has resigned his federal position, recently expanded when he took over the Long Beach housing office. At the Gardena Valley Chamber, MacDonnell will first undertake a postwar planning program, it was announced. This will include improvement of Alondra Park as a county recreation center, flood control and a solution of the southwest area water problem. As Chamber of Commerce secretary, MacDonnell is credited with lifting the Mattoon Act assessment district from Gardena Valley, paving the way for the residential and industrial development that has taken place in the last three years. MacDonnell served as war housing aide to the city of Torrance for almost a year, during
