Torrance High Goes Down in Defeat Before San Pedro; Form Improving

Torrance High school's fighting Tartars for the second time in as many weeks have gone down in defeat with the same scores, 12 to 6. San Pedro scored their first touchdown via the air route with Dave Newman of Pedro on the receiving end. Their second touchdown was plunged over from their two-yard line, their fullback carrying it over.

Eddie Robst, Torrance high's first-string right half, scored Torrance's lone tally, intercepting a San Pedro pass and running 40 yards for a touchdown. The following is a summary of the Torrance-San Pedro football game.

San Pedro kicked off to Torrance to start the game. Gordon Smith received the kick on the 15-yard line and ran it back to the thirty. Gerald Jackson crashed the center for five yards and Gordon Smith repeated for another five yards and a first-down. Gordon Smith then called a series of passes, with none of them clicking. Jackson kicked the ball on fourth down to the San Pedro 25-yard line. San Pedro's ball, first and ten.

San Pedro tried two line plays, but the Torrance forward wall was wide awake, so they kicked on third down. Torrance received the ball on their own 40-yard line. Torrance tried the center of the line for no gain. On second down, Jackson threw a pass that was intercepted and returned to the Torrance 20-yard line. San Pedro next clicked on a 40-yard pass for the first touchdown. The conversion was blocked. Score: San Pedro, 6; Torrance, 0.

San Pedro Leads
The rest of the first half was spent between the two 30-yard markers, with both backfields finding the opposing lines very tough. The half ended with the score 6 to 0, in Pedro's favor.

San Pedro again kicked off to start the second half, the ball being run back to the Torrance 25-yard line, first and ten. In the third quarter it looked like Torrance had finally found themselves. They marched down to the San Pedro 12-yard line with Gerald Jackson doing most of the running, in and outside of tackle. But the Tartars were given a 15-yard penalty for an illegal shift, which stopped their only real scoring threat of the day.

In the next 15 minutes the ball changed hands several times, with pass interceptions and fumbles being the order of the day. Finally San Pedro intercepted one of Gerald Jackson's passes and ran it back to the Torrance 35-yard line. On their first play they passed to Torrance's two-yard line, where

they plunged over for the second tally. And once again the kick was blocked. This made the score 12 to 0, with about five minutes to play in the final quarter.

Torrance Scores
San Pedro kicked off to Torrance, with Eddie Robst returning the ball to the 40-yard line. Torrance at once began throwing passes, but they were not clicking, so San Pedro took over, first and ten. They plunged the line without too much success and then tried a pass on third down. Before the grandstands knew what was happening, Eddie Robst had intercepted and was well on the way to Torrance's only touchdown. San Pedro blocked the kick. Score, 12 to 6.

The game ended shortly after, thus closing another chapter in the book of rivalry between Torrance and San Pedro. But another chapter will be written when the two teams clash again on Torrance's field for the last game of the season. This has always been a hard fought game with lots of thrills, so see you at the next game.

Torrance Man on Army Quintet Beat by French

Despite enthusiastic support from a loudly cheering crowd of French civilians, a basketball team of United States soldiers was defeated by a French quintet during a recent Sunday sports festival. Cpl. Henry A. Camou of Torrance was a member of the team at an undisclosed base in France.

Leading most of the way, the French five outpointed the Yanks, 24 to 22. The winning club, composed of railwaymen, displayed a well knit passing attack. Although the Americans seemed to outclass them in dribbling and general aggressiveness, the French offset the disadvantage, with fine teamwork.

Some 500 spectators, including a number of Yanks favored the liberators during the game, but lustily applauded the final decision and good naturedly derided the khaki-clad losers.

At the outset, the lead changed hands a few times before the French found their eye and tossed three baskets in a row. Thereafter, they held the lead down to the finish. A late rally in the second half drew the Yanks to within one point of the French team, but that was the closest they got to the front.

The contest was played on an outdoor dirt court with standard international regulations in effect. Each half ran for 20 minutes.
