They've lost everything they had—their clothes are torn, some have had their clothes shot off of them—all they have is the blanket or towel wrapped around them as they lie on the stretcher. They're given these bags with everything you have put in them and the kit bags save their lives—it keeps their minds off their troubles—it's something to do—something to look at, but most important, it's something to own, something in the world to call your own. They hold them then just as tight as they can and the first thing they do is tie the bag to the edge of their cot—when they move, they pack all their belongings in it."
