Possessing the Air Medal, he had been hoping that he could continue his flying duty and earn a fur-rough home, Powell said. Doctors told him that he may be out of flying duty for six months, and perhaps permanently. He is in England now instructing in gunnery.

Cpl. Cecil Powell, U. S. Army Infantry, was in the recent action in the Philippines, he writes, and is being returned to his former base and possibly home. He is in good health and spirits, the councilman said.

fronts of World War II, and members of the 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment, CSG, spent the weekend on the rocky cliffs and hills of Palos Verdes simulating actual combat against "paratroopers." The troops rounded out the maneuvers firing their 30 calibre U. S. rifles on the Army's 200-yard target range on Sunday and messed on Army "C" rations.

Under command of Major A. Milton Fish, the troops descended upon Rocky Point by-ouine area and there pitched their pup tents and engaged in their tactical problems, with Capt. H. F. Thienhaus, plans and training officer, directing, assisted by Capt. R. L. Lewellen, commander of Co. H, Torrance and Lomita; Capt. C. C. Church, commander of Co. A, Long Beach; Capt. Charles L. Johnson, commander of Co. F, South Bay district, Hermosa Beach; 1st Lt. George L. Maitrean, battalion adjutant, and Capt. Otis D. Clayton, Co. E, Bellflower.

On the range Sunday, Capt. Lewellen was chief range officer, assisted by 2nd Lt. Fred E. Barritt, Co. A, and 2nd Lt. E. M. Swenson of Co. E, with Capt. Church in charge of re-lays, Capt. M. E. Miller of Co. C, Long Beach, pit officer; 2nd Lt. Frank S. Selover, ammunition officer; Capt. S. C. Sault, commanding Co. D, Wilmington, 2nd Lt. Thomas Ramskill, Co. H, Capt. Lee Wynn, Hermosa Beach, and 1st Lt. Leon G. San Pedro, handling various classes in nomenclature of the rifle, trigger squeeze positions, use of the sling, sighting and triangulation.

Col. G. L. Coombs and Major M. G. Norum of Southern California Sector, Western Defense Command, with headquarters at Fort MacArthur, were observers.

### Park Fountain Moved After Car Hits It

In the manner of "locking the barn after the horse is stolen," the drinking fountain at El Prado and Cravens ave., on the park lawn, was placed in a new location Monday.

The reason: The fountain was knocked down by an automobile driven by Elvin Tarwater, Navy man from Port Hueneeme, who told police he swung up over the curb and hid the fountain in order to avoid a collision with another automobile.

Fred Blake, park superintendent, and his crew installed the new fountain at a post well back from the sidewalk and curb.

### L. A. Strip Gets Little Action From Police

The unofficial "no-man's land" status of the Los Angeles "Shoe-string district that connects the metropolis with its harbor is getting very little attention from Los Angeles police officers but today something of a refreshing nature was reported.

Police authorities at the harbor were told by an officer that street signs have been knocked down at 220th st. and Western ave., 219th and Denker, Carson and Haldale, and 219th and Haldale.

The report was made to Police Captain Basil L. Starkey at San Pedro.

San Pedro area is full of crime and it is not expected that police officers will cruise regularly in the Shoe-string until the force is replenished after the war. But it could have been expected of them that they quickly investigate Monday when a passing motorist found two boys tampering with a car and put in a call for officers.

The motorist kept an eye on the two lads for nearly an hour but at the end of that time no police had arrived, so he had to get up the nerve to investigate the case on his own, not knowing whether or not the two suspects were armed killers. He reports he was entirely dissatisfied with the explanation given by the suspects that their father owned the expensive car parked there in a remote spot, but he had business of his own to handle and couldn't spend more time taking care of police officers' obligations. He made no "citizen" arrest.

### Herald Is Next Thing to Being Home, Letter Says

Clifton Cullum thinks receiving the Torrance Herald "way out there" is next to being back in the United States. A letter, just received from Cullum, water tender, 3rd class, in the Navy, is quoted:

"Have received several of the Torrance Herald papers and I sure appreciate receiving them. Even if you can't be home to really enjoy the good old U.S.A. you really enjoy getting some news to read from home and find out how people are taking this war business. I enlisted in the U. S. Navy on Aug. 19, 1942, and have seen quite a bit of water and foreign land, but there's nothing like the good old U. S. A.

"In the Torrance Herald, I have read and found out that some of my old school mates are also out here but so far haven't been able to locate them.

"Well there's not much to say about things out here, but if things go like they have been it won't be long until we'll all be coming home again. Thank God."


### Two Torrance Men Escape In Auto Accident
