

Cpl. R. E. Tucker In Italy With 15th Air Force

Corporal Ray E. Tucker, 28, son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel A. Tucker of 1323 West 218th st., Torrance, is serving overseas with a 15th A.A.F. B-17 Flying Fortress unit in Italy. He has been overseas 13 months and is serving in the capacity of armorer. His wife, Mrs. Frances I. Tucker, resides in Torrance.

The unit to which he belongs has recently received the Unit Citation given by the President of the United States "for outstanding performance of duty in armed conflict with the enemy." The citation reads in part, "By the courage, heroism and determination of the air crews, together with the professional skill and devotion to duty of the ground personnel, the officers and men of this unit have reflected great credit upon themselves and the armed forces of the United States of America."

Presentation was made by Maj. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, commanding general of the 15th Air Force, who affixed the award to the colors of the unit after personally commending the organization.

Capt. Bender Awaiting Orders At Santa Monica

Capt. Carroll Bender of Torrance is among 20 Air Corps officers, all California men, who



are awaiting reassignment now at the Army Air Forces Redistribution Station in Santa Monica, Calif. Over half of them are veterans of bombing missions over Germany, France and the low countries. Four were stationed in the South Pacific, one in the Aleutians.

A flight commander, Capt. Bender, son of Mrs. William Hiatt, 21502 S. Berendo, Torrance, piloted a crew that accounted for 21 German planes in their bombing missions over Germany. His crew stuck together during all the time they spent in England, flying various ships, all named "Tarfu Jr." Capt. Bender wears "The Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three clusters."

Pfc. W. S. Jolley's Outfit Gets the Unit Citation

Private First Class William S. Jolley, 21-year-old radio operator, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Jolley of 2309 Torrance Blvd., Torrance, is among those honored by a Presidential Citation of the 4th Fighter Group of the Eighth Air Force, "as public evidence of deserved honor and distinction."

The fighter group, commanded by Col. Don Blakeslee of Fairport Harbor, Ohio, was praised by the citation for "its extraordinary heroism, gallantry, determination and esprit de corps" during the period from Mar. 5 to Apr. 24, 1944, when its P-51 Mustang planes destroyed 323 German planes, 189 in aerial combat and 134 by strafing attacks.

One of the veteran air combat organizations of the European Theatre of Operations, the 4th Fighter Group is a unit of the 2nd Bombardment Division, commanded by Maj. Gen. William E. Kepner, and has a long record of bomber escort, ground strafing and dive bombing.

Members of the group, both pilots and non-flying personnel, are entitled by the citation to wear a gold-bordered blue ribbon as evidence of their contribution to the achievements of the Blakeslee group.

BEN D. BOWEN, a conswain, returned recently for a 30 days' leave following one and a half years' service in the South Pacific. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Bowen of 2751 218th st., Long Beach, and formerly of Torrance.

The course includes instruction in B-24 fundamentals, structures, fuel and electrical systems, propellers, instruments, hydraulic systems, engine operation and airplane inspection.

Easy to bake for Holiday eating!

THE HOLIDAY season is "just around the corner" and now is the time to think about the good things we can bake—good things to top off any fine dinner! For example, a fruit cake or a special pie or a holiday pudding.

DARK FRUIT CAKE
1 cup enriched flour 2 cups seedless raisins
1/2 tsp. nutmeg 1/2 cup thinly sliced 1/4 tsp. cloves citron
1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 cup thinly sliced 1/2 cup shortening candied orange peel
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed 3/4 cup chopped nut-meats, peanuts, walnuts, pecans, etc.
4 eggs

Sift and measure flour; sift again with spices and salt. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture gradually, combining thoroughly. Fold in fruits and nutmeats; mix. Pour into loaf pan (8x5x3) lined first with well-greased manila, then waxed paper. Bake in slow oven (275° F.) 2 1/2 hours or until done. Makes 1 loaf.

Note: Cake is the "quick-baking" type. May be stored for only a few weeks.

TWO-IN-ONE PIE
3 medium-sized enough pastry for cooking apples 2 crusts
2 tps. flour 1 tbsp. butter or 6 tpsps. sugar margarine
1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 cup mince-meat 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 cup fruit juice or cider

Peel and slice apples; sprinkle with combined flour, sugar and spices. Divide pastry in half; roll out each half. Make two large turnovers using apple filling dotted with butter or margarine in one, mincemeat with fruit juice or cider in the other. Seal well and place together in one 9-inch pan. Prick marking in top of each turnover, using A for apple and M for mincemeat. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 10 minutes—reduce heat to moderate (350° F.) and bake 40 minutes longer or until done.

CHICKEN FRICASSEE

OLD FASHIONED FRICASSEE: Leave fowl whole or cut into pieces for serving. Place fowl in large kettle, add water to cover. Add seasoning as salt, onion, celery; cover and cook at simmering temperature (just below boiling point) until meat is tender, about 2 hours. To serve, remove chicken and thicken broth with flour mixed into paste with little water, allowing 1 1/2 to 2 tpsps. flour for each cup of broth.
