Validation dates for five more blue ration stamps, used for processed foods, were announced by the Office of Price Administration today.

Blue stamps X-5, Y-5, Z-5, A-2 and B-2, each worth 10 points—a total of 50 points—will be good beginning Dec. 1. They may be used indefinitely. No other stamps are expected to be validated for processed foods until Jan. 1, 1945.
