

Revised Plans For Anaheim St. Bridge Okayed

Revised plans have been completed and bids are expected to be called soon by the state for a 56-foot wide bridge on Anaheim st., at the Garvey and Vermont intersection, Harbor City, Guy Donald, district city engineer, reported today.

Present plans call for completion of the new span, replacing a narrow wooden bridge, by the time Anaheim is reopened to traffic after repaving of the Bixby slough fill, it was announced. Settling of the fill and repaving will take another six months, engineers anticipate.
