Torrance high school has a new physics and chemistry teacher, Mrs. Alwilda C. Dartt, formerly of Gompers Junior high school and Barstow Senior high school.

Mrs. Dartt received her degree from the University of Colorado and did post-graduate work at U. S. C.

Upon being asked her opinion of Torrance high, she replied, "I enjoy the friendliness of the students and the faculty. I'm sure later experiences will substantiate my first impression of Torrance high—that it is a fine place to teach."

Another new member of the Torrance high school faculty is Neil J. Cannon. He was born in Superior, Wisconsin, and attended the Marquette university, Milwaukee; University of Southern California, and University of Chicago. He was trained to be a lawyer. He has taught in seven different states and began in 1922 as a coach at a high school in North Dakota. Last semester was his first in the Los Angeles City School system. He is temporarily filling the place vacated by Miss Lois Kelley and after the arrival of the permanent teacher he will take over the part-time classes.

Miss Jane Fohl is the new girl's physical education teacher, replacing Mrs. Helen Rich. Miss Fohl's home town is Wilmington, Calif. She attended Banning Junior high school and later went to U. C. L. A. She taught at John Muir Junior high school in Los Angeles for five years. Miss Fohl joined the WASSP but they were disbanded Dec. 20, 1944. She received her training at Ayinger Field, Sweetwater, Tex., and she was stationed at Gardner Field, Taft, Calif.

John M. Kennedy will replace Miss Lois Kelley in the social studies department. He comes to Torrance from San Pedro high. He received his A. B. degree in Washington, D. C., and his master's degree from the University of Southern California. He has taught in Canada, England, and Northern California. His home is in Long Beach.
