

Man Injured as He Walks Along Western Avenue

Benjamin Dawson, 69, of 1660 203rd st., was injured Sunday morning when struck by a car driven by William Edward Stewart, 1007 West 75th st., Los Angeles, according to police.

Stewart was driving north on Western when the accident occurred, going home from work, and did not see Dawson walking on the shoulder provided for pedestrians until too late to avoid striking him. The accident occurred one hundred feet south of 203rd st.

Skid marks showed the car traveled twenty feet after the brakes were applied, Dawson was lying twelve feet in front of the car, where he was hurled when hit. He was removed to the Torrance hospital. He had several cuts and bruises about his head and face.

Officer A. S. Thompson answered the call at 12:45 a.m.

TORRANCE NEWSMAN PUTS INDUSTRY, UNITED NATIONS PEACE PLAN BEFORE U. S.

A proposal to produce "material manifestation of the aims of the United Nations," at the forthcoming San Francisco conference came out of Torrance this week, authored by Edsel Newton, 2417 Neece ave., widely known Southern California newsmen and marine editor. The proposal was published in the Long Beach Press-Telegram and Sun and immediately picked up and sent throughout the nation by press associations. The response has been terrific.

Newton who is associated with the Herald-News, urged the United Nations to back up a world-touring world's fair in a fleet of Liberty ships—"to carry a new era of peace, progress and utilization of world resources to a large part of the globe's population."

Strong Support
He has had every encouragement from shipping men and industrialists to whom he has taken supporting preliminary plans.

"But without United Nations support we can do little; they would have to make hundreds of ports duty free for such an exposition and render every other co-operation," Newton said.

"At least five and probably 15 Liberty Ships with their spacious holds should be utilized,

with proper air conditioning and other modernization for the purpose. And onto them would go building materials, plastics, food exhibits, drugs and chemicals, art exhibits, state, municipal and national exhibits—everything that makes up a world's fair—minus the 'gay way' exhibits. A billion people could see it."

Shipping men and foreign traders who were consulted agreed that the vessels can carry a vast number of exhibits.

Wedding Out
Newton proposes that all exhibits be processed through a staff of experts to insure that only the worthiest ones which would enhance world relations and international trade be admitted.

"This is one of the steps that should follow the Dumbarton Oaks plan for an international banking system," the author of the plan concluded.

"It will require the highest type of executives and administrators.

There will be no world unity without some material manifestation of it; ideals and talk about ideals won't either reform or regenerate the world. It's sick and it needs a shot of good-neighbor medicine. People will become acquainted with each other through their products. There should be a vast interchange of scientific, artistic and political experience and commerce in a world-touring exposition of this kind."

Newton and his growing number of associates in the proposal are establishing a special headquarters to further the project.

Use of Incinerators in Elimination Of Dumps Proposed by City Officials

Eventual elimination of public and privately-operated dump grounds here and elsewhere in the county by the building of modern incinerators is to be worked out by a six-man committee representing the county and its cities, including Torrance, according to Mayor W. H. Tolson.

City Engineer G. M. Jain is a member of the committee. Los Angeles has completed plans for four incinerators, one of them in the harbor area, and will start building them as soon as the war production board eases restriction on critical materials, spokesmen said.

Priorities have been requested to build a central incinerator at E. Twenty-sixth st., and the Los Angeles river and that a similar plea would be filed for the other three plants if the city council saw fit to authorize it.

The committee also is to draft recommendations on the handling of non-combustible materials, such as tin cans, which in many cities, it was pointed out, are hauled and discarded at dumps where combustible refuse is burned.

Supervisor R. V. Darby, disclosed some cities have got rid of the disposal problem by setting up dumps in county areas. "Unless the county gets cooperation in solving the situation," he warned, "I'm going to insist that they be closed up. Putting the smoke and fumes in the other fellow's back yard is not the way to handle this kind of thing. It's too serious a public problem and it has to be handled right."

New Gasoline Coupons to Make Appearance Soon

New supplemental gasoline ration coupons, B7 and C7, are being issued now to eligible motorists by local O.P.A. boards and may be accepted by dealers, Paul Barksdale d'Orr, O.P.A. district ration chief, said today.

Coupons E3 and R3, which are for gasoline for non-highway use, are also currently being issued and acceptable now.

Coupons B5, B6, C5, C6, E1, E2, R1 and R2 continue, valid until further notice, d'Orr said. For the information of deal-
