

CITY COUNCIL DENIES ALL PROTESTS AND PERMITS RUBBISH DUMP IN WALTERIA

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facturing district, was challenged in a letter read Tuesday night.

L. W. Fraser, of 25934 Cypress St., Lomita, declared that an examination of zoning ordinances indicates that the council has no right to establish a rubbish dump in Walteria area or any other area except in a heavy manufacturing zone.

Miss Fraser, leader of a group of Lomita residents protesting a rubbish dump in Walteria, previously had declared that the smoke and odors from the dump would damage the value of property in Lomita.

Her letter to the Council read:



ADVANCED TRAINING

"Recently I circulated petitions addressed to the Los Angeles city council and the Los Angeles county board of supervisors, protesting against the location of a refuse dump in the vicinity of Walteria. A copy of this petition was forwarded to the city council of Torrance, and I am told was placed on file. I secured 50 signatures to the petitions, but do not let this small number give you the impression that the protest was unpopular or met with a half-hearted response. On the contrary, every person I approached signed willingly, and the number of signers I might have secured probably could have been much greater. If I had had the time to continue the circulation of the petitions, I spent two Saturday afternoons on the job, and the names secured represent practically every resident in the small area I covered in my own neighborhood.

City Business Is Transacted

"Our protest against the refuse dump proposed to be established by the city or county of Los Angeles or both, was not directed against this action in prejudice to either of these agents, but was directed against the establishment of a dump of any kind regardless of who proposed it. We do not feel that we should now withdraw our objections, merely because the proponent of the nuisance has been changed, from the city or county of Los Angeles to the city of Torrance.

Appropriated not to exceed \$800.00 for materials for a frame garage and storage building for the electrical inspection department, in the parking lot at the rear of the police station, labor of construction to be performed by city forces.

Authorized the advertising for bids for one diesel-operated, track laying tractor, equipped with a one cubic yard, hydraulic loader, for Street Department.

Authorized construction of sidewalk on East side of Crenshaw boulevard, between Crenshaw boulevard and the first alley north; work to be contracted out by city at estimated cost of \$200.00, of which John Lessor, owner of apartment house at this location, agrees to pay \$75.00.

Authorized employment of Sam Estes as a Park Maintenance Man, as a war emergency employee, at a salary of \$170.00 per month, effective March 14, 1945, replacing Neal Webb, deceased.

"Establishment of a refuse dump could not legally be done in an area designated under Ordinance No. 316 as A-1, or agricultural, without a proceeding to change the zoning of this area to M-2, which is the only city legal hearing has been held.
