However, 4 1/2 to 8 are rationed and rather scarce in some areas. By putting all infants' leather shoes on an equal rationed basis, it is expected there will be less demand for the smaller sizes, paving the way for increased production of the larger sizes needed when children start walking.

Expansion Of Fairfleet Plan Before Group

The SeaFair-International proposal of Edsel Newton of Torrance to operate a FairFleet of surplus ships after the war in a waterborne world-touring trade exposition is being considered by a Long Beach area committee, including one representative from Torrance.

Newton, marine newsmen with the Long Beach Press-Telegram & Sun and associated with the Torrance Herald, will explain his proposal to a group that is expected to form the nucleus of a nation-wide organization.

Tentative plans call for formation of a nation-wide FairFleet committee to work for the setting aside of the ships and to interest American manufacturers and other possible exhibitors in the project. From Long Beach, the plan would be expanded city by city, with able area chiefs named by mayors of cities or from headquarters.

Prominent business leaders in distant cities have written to Newton to offer assistance. The heads of one of the nation's greatest railroad systems, he declares, are encouraging him to proceed with the plan.

The proposal first broke in the nation's newspapers March 5. Seeking criticisms of the idea, he says he has found none. The committee is scheduled to meet in Long Beach tomorrow evening, Frank Selover, Torrance Herald city editor, has been designated as the Torrance member.
