Cut in Sugar Canning Ration Is Announced

Because of curtailed production of sugar, substantial reductions of the civilian ration quantity for home canning was announced here today by Paul Barksdale d'Orr, Southland Office of Price Administration ration chief.

In a wire to all Southland local war price and ration boards d'Orr outlined the changes as follows:
1. The maximum allowance per person was cut from 20 pounds to 15 pounds effective May 1.

2. A family unit may not obtain more than 120 pounds. The previous amount was 160. This means that all families with more than eight persons will be held to 120 pounds for canning purposes.

All local boards were warned by d'Orr to exercise great care in the issuance of canning sugar.
