

### Torrance Growth Into Leading City Challenges Churches, Pastor Says

Torrance is rapidly emerging from the period of adolescent immaturity and is moving into the full manhood of a great and leading city. The next ten to 25 years will witness startling changes in our community.

Torrance churches, in the light of these new conditions and in order that they might meet them adequately, must rapidly progress to the fullest measure of maturity and manhood, expressed in greater spirituality, strength and service.

So stated the Rev. H. Wesley Roloff, pastor of the Central Evangelical Community Church, at the annual congregational meeting of the local church held on Wednesday evening in the Guild Hall.

A challenging view of future opportunities and responsibilities, particularly as they apply to new residents and returning servicemen of the growing Torrance community, was pictured by the pastor.

After a pot-luck fellowship dinner served at 6 o'clock and a brief devotional period, the business of the church was presented. Reverend Roloff, the presiding chairman, gave a resume of the church's progress through the year indicating gains in membership, attendance and spiritual life.

The treasurer's report, presented by W. E. Bowen, revealed substantial financial gains through the year.

New business included the election of a trustee, treasurer, and the officers of the Central Church Sunday school. The proposed church budget, presented by the finance committee of the church, was adopted subject to final approval of the first quarterly conference.

Announcement was made of the Memorial Day service to be held Sunday, May 27, at 11 o'clock. "Lest They Die in Vain" is to be the pastor's theme. The California Annual Conference sessions were also announced to be held in the First Evangelical Church of Los Angeles, June 7-10. Bishop C. H. Stauffacher of Kansas City and Dr. R. H. Mueller of Cleveland are the principal conference speakers.

### Air Pollution Engineer Takes County Post

Arriving from Chicago this week, I. A. Deutch has taken over his duties as newly appointed air pollution engineer for Los Angeles county. Dr. H. O. Swartout, air pollution control officer announced today.

Deutch will have charge of technical investigations for the purpose of determining the sources and nature of various types of smoke, fumes, and gases which have plagued the county in the past. He will also recommend methods of abatement.

The engineer was with the Department of Smoke Inspection and Abatement in Chicago for 20 years.

He is a graduate in chemical engineering at the Armour Institute of Technology, Chicago and is a member of the Smoke Prevention Society of America.

After a tour of the county in which he observed industrial plants, freight yards, and rubbish dumps, Deutch had the following to say relative to the problem here:

"There is no reason why Los Angeles county should not be and cannot be the cleanest industrial community in the world. This can be achieved without undue hardship to industry.

### Three Youths Are Chosen for Boys' State Program

Three boys have been chosen from Torrance High school to represent this community at California Boy's State, to be held at Grant Union High school and junior college, North Sacramento, from July 20 to 27. They are Gerald Godard, member of the football and track team, Bill Stanley, member of the baseball, tennis, and basketball teams, and Ralph Jaquibowski, member of the basketball team and scholarship society. These boys will be sponsored by the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs as well as the American Legion which sponsors the entire Boy's State program.

California Boy's State is a model state government. Boys run for all of the offices in the state administration, governor, lieutenant governor and others.

All representatives are chosen for their leadership, scholarship and citizenship. The purpose of this is to give the boys of the state an inside view into the workings of their own state government.

The purpose of the Navy Material Redistribution Center is to salvage surplus Navy materiel and reissue usable parts to Navy activities where they are needed, he explained.

### Operator of Slaughter House Here Sentenced

Lawrence Ihde, operator of a cattle slaughter house at 238th and Madison sts., Torrance, was sentenced Friday to 20 days in the county jail by City Judge O. B. Willett, Torrance for violation of the sanitary code. Ihde was given a suspended sentence with one year's probation, contingent upon the fact that he cease slaughtering cattle and that he comply with the sanitary requirements of the health department.

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as assistant disbursing officer for two years before going aboard the U.S.S. Mt. Vernon for a 15-month tour of duty. During his time on the Mt. ### Torrance and L.A. Fire Chiefs Issue Warning

Chief J. E. McMaster, of the Torrance Fire Department advises all Torrance residents that the burning hours within the city limits of Torrance are from sun-up to 10 a.m. and from 4:30 p.m. to sun-down, in approved incinerators. Every home, he urged, should be provided with an approved incinerator and it should be maintained in good condition.

Incinerators may not be placed closer than ten feet from any fence or building. Metal barrels may be used until such time as necessary to secure incinerators however they must be covered with a wire mesh cover.

There can be no burning of open fires at any time without a fire permit which can be se-

cured at the Fire Department free of charge.

Meanwhile, for the benefit of the residents of Los Angeles in the strip just east of Torrance, Fire Chief John H. Anderson, of Los Angeles, has issued the following rules for burning:

"Burn all combustible rubbish in an incinerator.

"Legal burning hours in Los Angeles areas are from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

"Make sure your incinerator is equipped with a spark arrester in good condition.

"Burn open piles of combustible rubbish in small quantities at a time and only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.

"Don't burn standing grass,

wild oats, barley and other weeds, without a permit. You may obtain one at your nearest fire station. Carefully follow the burning regulations which will be given to you verbally by the fire captain issuing the permit.

"Never be guilty of leaving an open fire unattended.

"Don't burn at all if it is windy.

"Keep matches away from children.

"Don't throw smoldering cigarettes from automobiles."
