

Victory Gardens

Fruit in the Backyard

Apply sulphur dust frequently to backyard grapes so that the covering on the leaves will be complete as the vines grow and so that the inside leaves will be covered before they are buried with a mass of foliage. This material will prevent the start of mildew but will not destroy it if once established.

Peaches in the backyard should be thinned so that better sizes will result. Early varieties should be thinned late in May and later varieties about June 15. Leave peaches on the leaves apart. Thinning fruit too early may increase the proportion of gumming or split-fruit. The small, early and mis-shapen specimens should be removed at thinning time.

Fruit trees will be in need of irrigation on medium and heavy soils by the end of May. Trees on light soil should probably receive water by mid-May. When applying water remember trees are not dependent upon the soil right around the base of the trunk and that no water should be applied within a foot or a foot and a half of the trunk. Roots extend sideways many feet — as far as the tree is high — and will go down several feet, depending upon the type of soil. Adequate moisture must be maintained in this widespread root zone if trees are to maintain vigor and health and at the same time size their fruit and grow. A special circular on care of backyard fruit trees has been prepared for Los Angeles County conditions and is available at the address given above.

Vegetable Planting From now to the end of June is the time when tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants should be established in the garden. Weather is warm and plants will grow rapidly and vigorously. Pearson variety of tomatoes, while not the only good kind, is probably the most reliable and will give better results than most others not only in the backyard but in commercial plantings. It is reasonably resistant to disease and is more tolerant of cool nights than the others—in other words, it won't set fruit when the others won't. The California Wonder

bell pepper is the favorite; and New York, Black Beauty, or Long Purple eggplant are good varieties. Buy plants at your neighborhood nursery store.

Space the Pearson tomato plants at least four feet apart each way unless they are to be staked. In the latter case, put them two or two and one-half feet apart with rows four feet apart. If you plant other kinds of tomatoes — Stones, Beefsteaks, etc., use a 5 by 5 or 6 by 6 spacing when not staked. Space peppers 20 inches apart and eggplant 30 inches apart in two and one-half foot rows. Four to six pepper or eggplants should be sufficient for the average family.

Water all such plants thoroughly when they are set in the ground. If they were grown in very sandy soil, better results will be had if most of this sandy soil is shaken off and the roots straightened out and planted full depth and are thus brought into contact with your own garden soil. Give a second watering in three or four days and if the weather is hot shade the plants. After they are established watering should be more infrequent.

If these "low clouds or morning fog" continue to invade most of Los Angeles County daily, it won't be long until mildew will be a problem. It will affect many garden plants with a gray coating on leaves and stems. Dusting with sulphur is a mildew preventative, not a mildew cure. So start before the trouble shows. Do not use it on melons or squash because of danger of burning. A spray of red or yellow copper oxide should be used on these tender plants.

"Dusting" does not mean "plastering." A cloud of dust should be blown in some way, preferably with a duster, so that it will drift through the plant, coating the leaves thoroughly, but not discoloring them. If you can't buy a duster, borrow your wife's vacuum cleaner. Hook on the hose which she uses to blow the dust out of cracks in the window sill, and stand it on a box in the garden where it will not draw dust inside. With a paper funnel you can dribble a stream of sulphur into the air blast, and you'll do a "cracker-jack" job of dusting. If there is too much air, put a cardboard down the intake and "choke" down the air volume. Do not put the dust through the vacuum. Maybe you'd better send your wife to the store before you try it!
