**Bad Wound Is Suffered by Lt. G. W. Nelson**

First Lieut. Gordon W. Nelson of the 96th Division, Tenth Army, has been reported wounded while participating in the Battle of Okinawa. He was wounded April 6, 1945, and is hospitalized at Saipan, where he is awaiting transportation to United States.

Nelson had seen action on Leyte when he landed with the First Infantry on that island. He served through the entire engagement there. Then he went with the 96th to Okinawa where, after participating in several battles, he was seriously wounded.

He received his officer's training at Ft. Benning, Ga., and intelligence schooling in Maryland. His sister, Mrs. W. W. Holm, resides at 1731 Cabrillo ave., Torrance.

In a letter received by his father, Nelson related many of the "blow-by-blow" incidents he experienced during the operation that took place on Leyte. He said that "in the minute, 10 o'clock Friday morning, October 20, the assault wave of which this outfit was a part, hit the beach. At 10:52 the American Flag was raised for the first time in over two years."

It was on the third day that the battle really began for Nelson and his outfit as they were trapped and fired upon by a large Jap force dug in on a certain undisclosed hill where the Nips had an ideal position. Here they stayed for the next seven days, practically pinned down.
