Added Chest Aid Extends Services

The great extent to which Community Chest agencies have been enabled to increase their health and welfare services during the last six years, due to added contributions from people of the Los Angeles area, is set forth in a survey just completed by Community Welfare Federation, it was announced by H. R. Erkes, chairman of the Federation's budget committee. Allotments have risen 68.11 per cent since 1938.

The Los Angeles area now almost equals other large metropolitan areas in funds given by citizens for health and welfare services, Erkes stated. The survey points out, however, that increases have been made at a time of great population growth, war tensions and intensified social problems.

Erkes declared that great commendation is due the more than 700,000 War Chest subscribers, whose contributions currently finance Community Chest agencies, in making the added service possible, while they were as well generously meeting their responsibilities for services to the armed forces, for Allied relief causes, and in the purchase of war bonds.

Changes have been made as needed in the application of funds, Erkes said, to meet rising costs of food and materials, war needs and shifting populations.

Increases were made on the greatest scale for youth agencies and the prevention of delinquency, Community Chest youth

Care for dependent children was increased by 29.33 per cent; day nurseries receive 54.22 per cent more; 70.34 per cent more is spent for protective services for children, adoption and foster home care; 80.81 per cent additional for maternity homes.

Clinic and health education budgets have been increased 156.68 per cent. Admission of Visiting Nurse Association added to health appropriations.

Funds for families and individuals, including specialized services such as legal aid, rehabilitation, care of destitute mothers and their children, and services to veterans increased 84.17 per cent.

Several new districts were included in Community Chest agencies' service area and with a war swollen population in all areas, agencies now are called upon to serve 34 per cent more than six years ago, the survey shows.

Rules For Sale Of Used Cars Are Tightened

OPA moved today to afford greater protection to purchasers of used automobiles when its regulation governing warranty, or guaranteed, sales was tightened by the adoption of an amendment made effective August 1.

Under the terms of the new provision only dealers who possess adequate equipment to supply complete repair services, or those who have working agreements, evidenced by contracts, with service suppliers having adequate repair facilities, will be authorized to make warranty sales, OPA said.

In the past any dealer who operated a repair shop in connection with his sales or display rooms was automatically permitted to consummate warranty sales.

Rabies Cases Bring Action By County

In many localities of Los Angeles County quarantine measures against animal rabies have been lately instituted. In other sections of the County quarantine has been in effect for some time.

Every day cases of animal rabies are reported to the Health Department and Pasteur treatment is started for those

people who might have been bitten. Each rabies case necessitates a thorough investigation by the health department.

Added to this is the fact that each year local health departments within the County are receiving about 15,000 reports from people who have been bitten by dogs. These reports must also be investigated, because of the fact that rabies may be involved. This work also consumes much time.

In other words, the existence of rabies is time-consuming and therefore expensive. Much worse, of course, is the fact that it constitutes a threat to the life of people living in localities where it exists. Furthermore, the disease is a constant worry to those who are interested in

preventing its spread to their own dogs and in pets.

A leash law is other effect in the County and many dog owners have conscientiously observed it. They have also cooperated faithfully with quarantine measures. Others have not. Stray dogs are not uncommon. These are problems which can not be fully solved without community cooperation. The health department staff can never be large enough to solve it by law enforcement alone.
