Non-Rationed Gas Stoves Have Ceiling Prices

Although gas cooking and heating stoves were removed from rationing restrictions as of July 31, they are still subject to the legally established OPA ceiling prices.

This warning to consumers and dealers alike, was voiced today by Ralph H. Clarke, OPA consumer goods price specialist. Clarke declared that when this type of stove was taken off the list of rationed articles Wednesday, a great number of dealers and purchasers gained the mistaken idea that price ceilings had also been suspended.

"This is not the case," the OPA official said, "and price ceilings must continue to be observed in all sales."

Rules for Mailing Christmas Packs To Service Men Overseas Are Issued

Christmas package mailing time for men in the armed forces overseas is approaching, and Assistant Postmaster L. H. Deininger has announced the rules for their preparation.

Packages are to be mailed between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15, and the following postal announcement was released:

Arrangements have been made by the Post Office Department in cooperation with the War and Navy Departments (the latter including the Marines and Coast Guard) for the acceptance of Christmas parcels for members of our armed forces serving outside the continental United States. Postmasters are requested to bring the following requirements to the attention of mailers in order that such parcels may reach the addressee on time and in good condition.

The term "armed forces overseas" includes the personnel of our armed forces who receive their mail through an A.P.O. or Fleet post office in care of the postmaster at New York, N. Y., San Francisco, Calif., New Orleans, La., or Seattle, Wash., or an A.P.O. in care of the postmaster at Miami, Fla., Presque Isle, Maine, or Minneapolis, Minn., or through a naval installation or station in care of the postmaster of Seattle.

Time of Mailing

Christmas parcels for Army personnel overseas must be mailed during the period beginning September 15, 1945, and ending October 15, 1945, the earlier the better. Parcels destined for delivery in China, Burma, India, the Middle East, and the islands in the Pacific should be mailed as early as possible during the period stated, preferably not later than October 1, in view of the distances involved.

During this period requests from the addressee are not required in connection with Christmas parcels mailed to Army personnel. Patrons should endorse each gift parcel "Christmas Parcel." Special effort will be made to effect delivery of all Christmas parcels mailed during the periods stated above in time for Christmas.

Christmas cards for Army personnel overseas may be mailed at any time but patrons must mail such cards prior to November 15, 1945, if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas. The War Department advises that greeting cards for soldiers overseas must be sent in sealed envelopes and prepaid at the first-class rate.

Since Navy, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps personnel may receive parcels without a request at any time of the year, it is not the policy of the Navy Department to encourage the mailing of parcels during any particular period of time each year. The Navy Department suggests, however, that parcels intended as Christmas gifts be mailed not later than October 15 to afford some degree of probability of delivery prior to Christmas day, depending upon the destination and tempo of the war effort, and that parcels for personnel known to be in an area which would permit mailing subsequent to October 15 may be deposited for mailing at a date selected by the sender.

Size and Weight

Christmas parcels for Army, Navy, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps personnel shall not exceed 5 pounds in weight or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. The War and Navy Departments have pointed out that members of the armed forces are amply provided with food and clothing and the public is urged not to include such matter in gift parcels. The public can ascertain what articles their relatives and friends overseas can secure locally by correspondence with such person and should limit their gifts to articles not readily obtainable by the recipient. Not more than one Christmas parcel or package shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same addressee.

Guard Against Flies, County Officer Urges

Flies can carry every kind of disease germ that is found in any body discharge, whether that discharge comes from bowels, bladder, nose, throat, mouth, ears, eyes, or an open sore or abscess.

They can spread typhoid fever, dysentery, tuberculosis, diphtheria, and certain skin infections. Since the virus of infantile paralysis has been found in the bodies of flies caught near places where infantile paralysis patients have been, they are under suspicion as possible spreaders of this disease, too.

Our wartime shortage of meat, with an increased number of people raising and dressing rabbits and chickens for home or neighborhood use, has multiplied the chances of fly breeding.

In fighting flies, and thus preventing the diseases which they might otherwise spread, you should see that the body discharges of all the members of your household are disposed of in such a way that flies cannot get to them.

See that your kitchen, dining room, and food storage places are well screened.

Trap or poison flies.

Clean up the places on your premises where flies like to breed.

Report to your health department any place where you find flies breeding, if these places are not under your control.

State Receives 8964 Claims for Readjustment

California, between September 1, 1944, and May 1, 1945, had received 8,964 claims for readjustment allowances from veterans of World War II, according to an announcement made by James G. Bryant, chairman of the California Employment Stabilization Commission.

Bryant said a report on veterans claims has just been received from Washington, D. C., indicating this state had 7.3 per cent of all the claims filed in the nation, being topped only by New York and Pennsylvania.

National figures indicate, however, that veterans, on an average, are not drawing their full amount of readjustment allowances. In California, the number of weekly payments in comparison to the total number of veterans filing claims, was only 5.4 out of a possible 24 to 52 weeks a veteran may draw insurance. Nationally, the number of payments was 6.2.

Preserve Spare Stamps in Book 4, Says Ration Chief

Guard well those "spare" ration stamps remaining unused in Ration Book 4—they're likely to come in handy during the period just prior to the valuation of the new food stamps contained in the new Book 5, on January 1, 1946.

This was the warning sounded today by Frank S. Balthis, Jr., OPA district director, following rumors to the effect that some holders of Book 4 had been negligent in preserving the spare stamps in that book.

Balthis stated that since the new Book 5 will not go into use until the first of the year, and the final sets of red and blue stamps in the old book will be validated for September and October, it will be necessary to make use of some of the "spares" in Book 4 for validation during the interim period, November and December.

Boxes for overseas transmission should be stronger than containers used for parcels which do not leave our shores. Because of the great distance these parcels must be transported and the handling and storage they must undergo, it is absolutely necessary that all articles for overseas be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard, testing at least 200 pounds.

Each box should be securely tied with strong cord, preferably by four separate pieces, two lengthwise and two crosswise, knotted at crossings. Sealing the flaps with gummed tape where they meet strengthens the box by the use of such tape alone is not satisfactory since the tape loosens if the boxes become wet or exposed to moist atmosphere.

Boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that the contents will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosening of the articles within the parcels. Unless completely padded and tightly filled, boxes are apt to be crushed.

The War Production Board has approved the manufacture of boxes approximately 10 by 6 by 4 inches in size, which will be of greater strength and will permit more compact packing within the 8-pound weight limit than the containers previously approved.

It is also desirable that all fiberboard boxes be securely wrapped in heavy paper, if available, which materially strengthens the boxes. The boxes should be tied as above suggested, before and after applying the heavy paper wrapper. Sealed boxes should bear the printed inscription authorizing opening for postal inspection.

When combination packages are made up, including miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soaps, etc., the contents should be tightly packed, in order that the several articles may not be loosened in transit, damaging the contents or the covering of the parcels. Christmas boxes should be enclosed in substantial containers. Hard candies, nuts, caramels (including those covered with chocolate), cookies, fruit cake, and chocolate bars individually wrapped in waxed paper, should be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal, or cardboard. Soft candies, whether home-made or commercial, do not carry well. Sealed packages of candy, cigars, tobacco, and toilet articles in simplest mercantile form may be placed in parcels without affecting the parcelpost classification of such packages. Sharp-pointed or sharp-edged instruments, such as razors, knives, etc., must have their points or edges protected so they cannot cut through their coverings and damage other mail or injure postal employees.

Perishable Matter

Perishable matter will not be accepted, and the sending of fragile articles should be discouraged.

Intoxicants, inflammable materials (including matches of all kinds and lighter fluids), and poisons, or compositions which may kill or injure another, or damage the mails, are unacceptable.

Addresses must be legible, in

typewriting or ink. It is preferable that the outside address be hand printed directly on the wrappers of the boxes rather than on labels pasted to the wrappers, since experience has shown that the labels frequently fall off when subjected to moisture. Copies of sales slips of retail stores should not be used as address labels. It is highly desirable that slips of paper containing the names and addresses of the sender and addressee and a list of the contents be inclosed in the parcels so that proper disposition of the parcels can be effected in the event the addresses on the outside become defaced in transportation, or the boxes become broken open and the contents scattered.

Parcels addressed to overseas Army personnel should show, in addition to the name and address of the sender, the name, including the full first name, rank, Army serial number, branch of service, organization, A.P.O. number of the addressee, and the post office through which the parcels are to be routed.

Parcels for naval personnel, including the Marine Corps and Coast Guard, should show, in addition to the name and address of the sender, the full name, rank, or rating of the addressee and the naval unit to which he is assigned with the Navy number assigned thereto, or name of the ship and fleet post office through which the parcels are to be routed.

Mail for Coast Guard personnel is addressed the same as for Naval personnel, except that the words "U. S. Coast Guard" shall be used in place of "U. S. Navy" after the man's name.

INVISIBLE NETWORK

It is the unseen network of radio communications and navigational aids operated by the Army Airways Communications System that makes possible the take off of a military plane every 15 minutes for a flight across the Pacific and every 13 minutes for Europe. These devices protect the routes over which 800,000 wounded and sick and 560,000 tons of cargo, mail and passengers were flown last year.

FOUR HOURS

Air transportation is aiding northern farmers who raise crops for the canneries. Recently 320,000 tomato plants, shipped in two planes, were moved from their Georgia growing field to a northern point in four hours instead of the usual four days required by ground transportation.

Two Thousand WACS Being Sent Overseas

Two thousand WACS will be sent immediately to the South Pacific to augment the 5,000 WACS now on duty in that theater of war, it was announced by Col. Westray Battle Boyce, the new commanding officer of the Women's Army Corps.

In a directive received at Los Angeles headquarters, WAC Detachment, First Lieutenant Eileen Knowler, commanding officer learned today that WAC recruiting will be stepped up to meet the needs of the Army in the fight against the Japs.

"New recruits are needed," said Lieutenant Knowler. "We are receiving more and more requests, and our quota of recruits has been raised to meet the needs. Women between the ages of 20 and 38, who have no dependents under 14 years of age, who are in good health and who have at least two years of high school education are urged to join the WAC now."
