Gilbert, Tolson And Hitchcock Sustain Bus Vote

Attorney McCall declared: "It still is my opinion that the council has the right to sell the municipal bus lines."
 However, McCall was to deliver a written opinion on the status of the sale to the council later.

When Cucci made his motion that sale of the bus lines be referred to the people, Councilman Hitchcock said: "You make this motion after the lines are already sold?" Cucci replied: "They are not sold." Mayor Tolson reported that the deal is in escrow.

Pressed for decision as to their plans, neither Cucci nor Hughes could give a direct answer, declaring that it was up to the attorneys for their cause.

Mayor Tolson ordered Hughes thrown out in a fit of anger after Hughes directed personal remarks at the mayor. Nothing happened, but Mayor Tolson later in the meeting publicly apologized for his actions declaring that he did not care what anyone thought of his action as mayor or a city councilman on official business, but that when they got personal it angered him.

The council voted 6 to 2 to sell the lines to Koors because, they claimed the bus lines cannot operate successfully and give the people the service they need under public ownership; that complaints from the people regarding unkept schedules, conduct of drivers and failure to serve properly various sections of Torrance warrant the sale to a private operator; that the lines never have made a profit except on fictitious depreciation figures; that they should be sold before they become a burden on the taxpayers.

Two cases came before the council Tuesday night reflecting the stand of Tolson, Hitchcock and Gilbert.

One was a complaint by A. S. Thompson, Gardena attorney, that one driver became so abusive with him that he would have had him arrested had a policeman been near. He said he would have to resort to the street-cars for transportation between Los Angeles and Gardena for fear that he would be involved in a bad wreck caused by drivers talking with patrons, failing to keep hands on the

steering wheel and eyes on the road.

The other issue of H. C. Callihan, No. 1 driver of the bus department, whom Cucci "fired" on his alleged charges of insubordination; absence from duty without reason; disrupting the service; violation of safety rules.

The Civil Service Board upheld Cucci's firing of Callihan, and Callihan had written a letter to the council declaring, that "no one councilman can dismiss a city employee and the civil service board has no right to sustain the councilman." Callihan having appealed the case, the council was asked if his assertion was correct. Referred to McCall for an opinion, in Cucci's words, "right now," McCall said that "one councilman does not have the right to dismiss a civil employee."

Cucci then tried to deny that he had Callihan fired, declaring that he merely had pressed charges against him. Letters on file with the city clerk's office showed, however, that Cucci had notified Callihan of his "dismissal", and of the civil service body's "sustaining" action.

Callihan, a friend of C. Z. Ward, bus manager, has a three-year perfect safety record.
