## U. S. Steel No Longer Interested In Acquiring Geneva Plant

Benjamin F. Fairless, president of United States Steel Corporation, has announced that after a full consideration of the whole situation, including the various problems which seem to be involved in attempting to establish the government-owned steel plant at Geneva, Utah, as a sound and successful commercial enterprise after the war, the directors of the corporation have decided that no further action be taken to acquire this plant. Fairless disclosed at the same time that the corporation had authorized a further step in the modernization program of United States Steel's Columbia Steel Company, through the installation at Pittsburg, Calif., as soon as equipment is available, of modern cold reduction facilities having an annual capacity of more than 325,000 tons of cold reduced sheets and tin plate.

The new cold reduction facilities to be erected at Columbia's plant at Pittsburg, Calif., will constitute a substantial additional investment by United States Steel in the far West, Fairless said. This is the first modern cold reduction mill to be authorized for erection on the Pacific Coast. It will produce sheets and tin plate comparable in quality to those manufactured anywhere in the country. When completed, the new facilities will create jobs for a considerable number of people. A study is now being made looking to the modernization of Columbia's facilities at Torrance, Calif.

Fairless added that if Defense Plant Corporation or the future operators of Geneva decided to manufacture hot rolled coils there, United States Steel would be glad to negotiate for the purchase of a substantial amount of these coils to be used in producing cold reduced products at Pittsburg, Calif., provided that determination is made in sufficient time to insure that the coils will be produced at Geneva concurrently with the completion of Columbia's new cold reduction facilities. This would mean a sizeable volume of steel business for Geneva and should contribute toward the successful operation of that plant.

"The report of Attorney General Biddle to the Congress under the War Mobilization and Reconversion Act made on June 28, 1945, the policy for the disposal of war plants announced by the Surplus Property Board on July 4, 1945, the reported statements of Col. Edward H. Heller and Gov. Robert A. Hurler, both members of that board in San Francisco on July 11, 1945, and the reported statement of W. Stuart Symington, recently appointed chairman of the board, on July 19, 1945, appear to us in practical effect to rule out United States Steel Corporation as a prospective lessee or purchaser of the Geneva plant, although Symington has since been quoted as saying that a bid from us will be considered.

"Under the provisions of the Surplus Property Act, the Surplus Property Board has general supervision over the disposition of surplus property and is empowered to prescribe regulations to govern the disposal of such property, and the Attorney General is required to

## Veterans' Taxi Ambitions Have Council Okay

Veterans who want to go into the taxi business in Torrance will have the backing of the City Council, it was indicated Friday night when two applications were presented. Both were referred to the council as a whole, but the body indicated that any local veteran who wants to go into the business will get a permit.

On hand at the meeting were applications from Miss Rose Marie Bruce, 2142 238th st., and George Mort, Box 507. Miss Bruce said that she wants to operate the taxi company in memory of her brother, Claude Bruce, who was killed in action on Jan. 25, 1942. She said she will hire veterans for all cars, that the company will be known as the Black and White Taxi Co., and that she has an ODT permit to operate. She said that she will operate from 1405 1/2 Sartori ave., and fares will be 30 cents for the first mile and 20 cents for each additional mile.

The other application, from Mort, was said to be in behalf of a Downey taxi company operated by C. Crawford. His application previously had been rejected. Mort is a veteran, but Chief of Police John Stroh declared that he is using his name only in the deal.

Urging all volunteers to rededicate themselves to the tasks at hand, Cursey E. Newlin, chairman of Los Angeles chapter, American Red Cross stated that V-J Day will signalize only the continuance of peak performance of the Red Cross in the immediate post-war years.

"The organization's workers will be called upon to meet the obligations of service," the chairman said, "being given to armies of occupation, to convalescing heroes in military hospitals, to families of servicemen here at home, to returning warriors adjusting themselves to civilian life, and to men, women and children in war-ravaged countries."

In the light of recent widely published statements that Western financial interests should be connected with the companies which are to supply the far West with steel in the post-war period, United States Steel Corporation announced that as of March 31, 1945, it had more than 17,000 stockholders of record in the 11 far Western states. These stockholders then owned an aggregate of 886,923 shares of common stock and 181,088 shares of preferred stock, the present market value of which is in excess of \$66,000,000. More than two-thirds of these stockholders are in the state of California.

## INDUCEMENTS OFFERED IF HILLS SITE CHOSEN FOR JR. COLLEGE; \$60,000 LOAN FUND ADVANCED

Students of five high schools in southwestern Los Angeles County will have access to a \$60,000 loan fund to aid them in attending the new Harbor Junior College if one of the Palos Verdes hill sites is chosen by the Los Angeles Board of Education for location of the school, according to Mrs. Audrey O. Snow, a property owner there.

The owners will donate the entire \$60,000 that has been appropriated for the building site for the college back to the school board earmarked for a student loan fund. The fund will be used for aiding worthy students who otherwise would be unable to attend college. "The Palos Verdes site is closer to the center of population of the area to be served by the school than is the 101 and Normandie site which was previously under consideration by the school board," Mrs. Snow points out. "The Palos Verdes site has a beautiful view of the entire surrounding country including the shore of the South Bay area and the harbor, including Long Beach, also the Sierra Madre mountains and greater Los Angeles, as well as the coastline south toward San Diego."

Future population growth during the coming 10 to 20 years will gradually bring the population center toward the Palos Verdes building site and away from the building site previously under consideration. This will be the result of rapid residential development in prospect in the 16,000 acre Rancho Palos Verdes area in the post war period. The Palos Verdes site is within a little over a mile of the actual geographic center of the area to be served by the school. It is less than a mile and a half from the present population center of the district. The average distance for students to travel to the junior college from the population centers of all the cities and towns in the district to be served by the school would be 3.2 miles. The average distance to the 101 Highway and Normandie corner is 3.4 miles. The distance traveled by Long Beach students from the center of population of Long Beach to the Long Beach Junior College is six miles, according to the Long Beach Chamber of Commerce.
