Koors Deal for Compton Bus Lines Completed; Takes Over Operations

The \$125,000 nine-bus Highland Transportation Co., 1410 N. Santa Fe Ave., was taken over Aug. 29 with consent of the State Railroad Commission by Charles F. Koors and associates. Koors said that an immediate application will be made to the railroad commission to extend service to the Bellflower district and that he already has orders in for 10 new Ford busses to cost \$85,000.

The company, now to be known as Southern Cities Transit, Inc., at present serves Compton, Hynes, Clearwater, Downey, Willowbrook, Richland Farms and Langer Park.

Koors, representing D. M. Brockway, western states distributor of Ford busses, took over possession of the Compton bus system from Lawrence P. Goltra, proprietor of the company since 1927. Goltra said he plans to take a long vacation.

The application for the extension of the Compton lines to Bellflower calls for a routing along Olive st. to Paramount blvd., thence south to Flower st., and into Bellflower. Two more Ford busses will be purchased if the railroad commission per-

mits this line. Koors has \$85,000 in escrow to buy Torrance Municipal bus lines, but the purchase is being attacked by W. J. B. Hughes, a taxpayer, in a mandamus action against the City of Torrance and members of the City Council attempting to require the city to proceed with the sale under the provisions of Act 5203. The petition, already served upon the members of the council, will be filed and presented to the court tomorrow at which time either an alternative writ or an order to show cause why the council should not proceed as asked in the prayer of the petition will be issued.

Walteria Memorial Plaque Contains Names of Men and Women in Service

Presentation of a memorial plaque containing the names of 125 men and women of the community serving their country in World War II has completed a war memorial program proposed to the community by George P. Thatcher.

In addition to the plaque, the program included the purchase and dedication of a book to every man and woman answering the call of his or her country from Walteria. The books were purchased and placed in the local library following a dedication ceremony November 26, 1944.

Members of the Walteria War Memorial committee sponsoring the project are Thatcher, who served as chairman; Mrs. B. Tuttle, treasurer; Mrs. Molly Dowd, Walteria librarian, book recorder.

Mrs. Dowd reports that at least 50 per cent of the memorial books are in circulation all the time. These books, all of which afford exceptional reading pleasure, were selected by friends and relatives of the servicemen and have proved a valuable addition to Walteria's library.

Names of men and women joining the armed forces from Walteria will be included in the list on the plaque. However, the memorial committee welcomes the dedication of books to any service man or woman, Thatcher said. "Several books have been received by our library from friends and relatives of servicemen other than Walterians," he said. "These books become the property of the community of Walteria and circulate only in Walteria. They are maintained by the Torrance library, making the memorial a permanent reminder of those who gave up homes, friends and loved ones in answering their country's call."
