### Alcoa Lease Here Cancelled By Government

Cancellation of the wartime leases of the Aluminum Co. of America's Torrance reduction plant by the Reconstruction Finance Corp. was announced Saturday, with similar termination of leases on four other Alcoa reduction plants in other parts of the country.

The R. F. C. action was taken after average production of aluminum in the company's plants furnished less than 40 per cent of their aggregate productive capacity for the six-month period ending July 31.

The Torrance plant, which was largely responsible for creating a great war-surplus of the metal, was "closed" many months ago. Only two of the eight plants built were ever in operation.

Pointing up the need for action on a program to give the West Coast an independent light metals industry, Alcoa's withdrawal from Los Angeles and from Spokane, Wash., follows the shutdown some time ago of Bohn Aluminum & Brass Corp.'s extraction plant at Torrance and leaves the West Coast area virtually barren of aluminum-making facilities. The cancelled leases, which would have expired in 1947 and 1948, will be formally terminated on Oct. 31.
