Touch Football Is Planned for Torrance Park

In conjunction with the Torrance city boys touch football program, a football passing, receiving and punting contest will be staged at the Torrance City Park, Saturday, Sept. 29. This event will have its start at 9:00 a.m. and will last all day.

Arrangements are being completed whereby four boys in each division will be allowed to compete in the Harbor Area Championships to be staged at Daniels Field, San Pedro, Oct. 13, at 10:00 a.m.

Eligibility runs in three classifications which are: Midgets, boys 13 years and under as of Oct. 1; Juniors, boys 15 years and under as of Oct. 1; seniors, boys 18 years and under as of Oct. 1.

Elmer "Red" Moon, recreation supervisor announced that for Torrance City Park Championships only, a separate classification for younger boys, age 11 years and under as of Oct. 1, will be created.

Moon stated that the same rules will apply but for the passing, which shall be 15 yards. He also reported that the city park will be open Mondays and Wednesdays after school, also on Saturdays for practice periods in both touch football and contest events.

Permanent Cafeteria Promised

A new permanent cafeteria building and a drafting building for Torrance high school are in the offing, Principal Harold Perry said Tuesday as he went over plans with architects for the new two-room temporary building to be constructed at the school.

"I believe that the board of education has Torrance in mind for its first permanent cafeteria, when materials are available," Perry informed the Torrance Herald.

He declared that the drafting room would be of a semi-permanent nature, but would be equipped with latest devices and mechanical drawing aides.

The high school will not gain any classrooms at this time, with the erection of the new temporary building upon which work will start at once, Perry said. He declared that two classes will be moved out of the main building, and the rooms utilized as guidance office and a text book room.

Construction of the new building which will be located southwest of the science building will require about 45 days, Perry declared.

Deer Plentiful as Hunters Take Field In Hills of Many California Areas

Many deer hunters were in the field September 16th, when the deer season opened in Fish and Game Districts 1, 1 1/2, 1 3/4, 4, 4 1/2, 22, 23, and 25 for a thirty day period. It is the consensus of wardens of the State Division of Fish and Game that deer are plentiful and in good condition in these districts. Reporting county by county they say:

Calaveras County—Deer hunting will be average. Deer are scattered. Have not seen many large bucks.

Fresno County (eastern portion)—A large number of hunters are expected to be out in the deer country in the Sierra section. Deer seem to be plentiful and in good condition.

Humboldt County—Deer hunting will only be fair on opening, but buck taken will be in good condition.

Inyo County—The deer in this area are still running in the higher elevations. If the weather keeps up, hunters will have to go high for their deer.

Kern & Tulare Counties—Prospects for the approaching deer season are very good.


