Annual Religious Education Week Starts Sept. 30

Secular education and religious education are twin pillars of democracy is the belief of John W. Studebaker, Washington, U. S. Commissioner of Education, as stated in his endorsement of the 15th annual Religious Education Week, September 30 to October 7, sponsored by the International Council of Religious Education and observed by 90 per cent of Protestant churches in the United States and Canada.

"Upon these pillars rests a responsibility for building citizens worthy of the spiritual inheritance which is ours as a people," Studebaker declared.

Harvey S. Firestone, Jr., Akron, Ohio, in endorsing the observance called for special preparations for religious education of returning servicemen.

"One of the inspiring revelations of the war," he said, "is the discovery by chaplains that many men in the armed forces have expressed a desire to know more about religion. We must prepare now to provide them and their children with facilities for religious education when they come home."

The importance of religious teachings in education is brought out by Ralph W. Gwinn, U. S. Congressman, 27th District, New York. He states that "there is no time to argue or speculate about religious education. Our fate in both war and peace depends upon it. The time is hard upon us when we must restore our traditional religious discipline in education to do right on our own account, according to God's commandments."

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
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
