



David Babcock Named Chairman For Red Cross

David T. Babcock, prominent business executive, will serve as volunteer chairman of the Los Angeles Red Cross 1946 fund campaign, starting date for which has been set for March 1.



It marks the third consecutive year that Babcock has served Red Cross in this capacity.

"Since the end of World War II hostilities, the demands upon the Red Cross here at home have trebled," Babcock pointed out in accepting the chairmanship. "Particularly is this true here in Southern California where Red Cross volunteers and staff personnel are on virtual round-the-clock call in carrying out assignments in military hospitals, at the port of embarkation, and in caring for the needs of returning veterans and their families."

"In addition, Red Cross faces vast expansion in the operation of its regular educational and training programs as part of our community life," Babcock said. "I consider it a distinct honor to again be selected to serve as chairman of the fund raising committee."

Within the next few days, Babcock is scheduled to name the top volunteer leadership to direct the fund raising campaign in the area served by Los Angeles Chapter.

County License Fees Will Be Increased

An amendment to the County license ordinance which will limit licenses to the first three months of the new year today had been adopted by the Board of Supervisors.

The board plans a revision of the fees with an increase of at least 50 percent.

The measure is applicable to Lomita and other unincorporated county territory but does not affect dog and bicycle licenses which are to be continued on an annual basis.

License fees received by the county during the past year totaled \$274,000, according to County Manager Wayne R. Allen's office, which was considerably below the cost of policing business licenses.

Multi-Million Dollar Expansion Will Aid Building Material Supply

A multi-million-dollar expansion of plants producing roofing paper, floor coverings, transit pipe, asbestos-cement pipe and paint is planned for early in 1946, Louis M. Breves, director of the Civilian Production Administration offices, announced.

Prior to some time during the first part of next year, however, there is little prospect of getting building materials for this area, he said.

Early cold weather has hastened the consumption of gas as fuel in dwelling units, with the result that the supply to local brick yards has been reduced. The yards are closing their kilns from six to eight weeks earlier than usual.

Wood shingles are still very scarce, and the production of roofing paper has been curtailed by the shortage of rags, which now generally are being used to

A film, "The Care of the Newborn Baby," and one on nutrition, "The Training Table," will be shown by the division of health education of the county health department.


