Seniors Best Juniors In Roughest Game

BY RALPH GEORGE A fourth quarter rally in which they scored thirteen points gave the T.H.S. Seniors a 19-7 victory over the weaker Juniors last Thursday on the Torrance field.

After fighting them on even terms through the first three quarters, the Juniors finally succumbed to the Seniors' advantage in weight and size in the final stanza.

The Seniors scored their first touchdown early in the initial quarter and by the case in which they scored, it looked like the game was going to be a walk-away for the Seniors when Dominguez hit the line for three yards, and on the next play Gene Holloman rambled 50 yards for the tally.

In the third quarter the eleventh-graders marched 46 yards in five plays for their only score of the day. The play off came on a 30 yard aerial from Gilbert Bennett to George Litchett in the end zone.

Leroy Schwenk converted putting the underdog in front 7-6 at the end of the third quarter.

Gene Holloman was the big gun of the second touchdown drive by the Seniors. Starting from their own 20, they drove 80 yards in eleven plays with Holloman averaging better than five yards a crack in carrying the ball six times.

Holloman circled the 80-yard drive by encircling end from seven yards out on a very nice play in which the quarterback faked to Dominguez through the center and then lateraled to Holloman who went over standing up.

The Seniors scored a few plays later after a bad kick by the Juniors which gave them a first down on the Junior 21. Holloman circled end for 12 yards and then "tractor" Dominguez "powerhoused" 3 yards through center to pay dirt.

Wardens Spot Game Violators From Airplanes

Cooperating patrols between air and ground wardens of the State Division of Fish and Game brought new worries—and court convictions—to fish and game code violators in Shasta County this month.

Working under Captain A. A. Jordan of the Redding district office, Warden-Pilot A. L. Reese and Warden R. Krukow took to the air in the division's patrol plane for a "bird's eye view" of the Redding area. Ten minutes after the takeoff they observed two persons snagging salmon below Redding on the Sacramento River.

Thirty minutes after their return to Redding, Krukow had cited Jackie Bridges, 13, and James Quain, 15, of Redding for snagging salmon. The juveniles were placed in the custody of the Shasta County probation officer who ordered them to memorize sections of the fish and game code covering the illegal take of salmon, and placed them on probation.

Airborne again, Reese and Krukow patrolled a wide area and observed violators working at Keswick Dam, the A. C. I. D. Dam, and on Cow Creek near Millville. They returned to Redding and Krukow made a quick run by automobile to the noted locations, where they arrested 12 men.

Commented the division's first flying warden: "If we had two-way radio between the plane and warden's cars, we could cover three times the area and direct the patrol cars to the scene with little delay after violations are observed."
