LEGISLATION TO CORRECT 'SHACK TOWN' CONDITIONS PROMISED BY V. THOMAS

Legislation will be introduced in the special session of the State Legislature which opened Monday to cope with conditions such as exist in the Los Angeles shoddy strip area just east of Torrance city line and immediately north of Ocean st. where a score of families are enduring the winter weather in tents, shipping box houses and other make-shift abodes.
This was revealed by Assemblyman Vincent Thomas as he departed for Sacramento.
The assemblyman said that under present statutes, it is impossible for any department of government except the City of Los Angeles to remedy the situation which was called to his attention by President H. B. Lewis, of the Torrance Lions club. He said that it is a problem of housing, health and sanitation; inasmuch as the rain-shed houses are without utilities and facilities incident to normal living. There are no streets and drainage is bad.
Several residents of the area have commented on the efforts of the Lions club to bring about cleaning up of the area due to its effect on Torrance economy, living standards and health. These comments, sent to the Torrance Herald, were referred to President Lewis, of the Lions, who said that the efforts was not one of criticism of families doing the best that they can do, but one of a system of government which will permit such living conditions.
