Car Owners Urged To Avoid Rush

Vehicle owners of Torrance and Lomita were admonished today by the Department of Motor Vehicles to secure 1946 registration renewal now before the grand rush starts.

Officials of the Department said the 1946 license tabs may now be secured at any of its offices without long waits in line or other inconvenience but that these conditions will not prevail very long because 1946 fees become delinquent at midnight Feb. 4 and the motorist will have to pay double fees after that date.

The 1946 license tabs are displayed by bolting them to the 1945 license plate. The tabs may be obtained by presenting the 1945 Registration Card (white slip) and the amount of the fee at the Department's Office at 700 E. Broadway, Long Beach, or 3500 S. Hope, Los Angeles.

Registration renewal may be had by mail by sending a postal bank of express money or cashier's check for the amount of the 1946 fee with the 1945 Registration Card to the nearest certificate issuing office of the Department or directly to Sacramento.

Employment Office Handles 3000 Weekly

Since the first of the year the local public employment office located at 1628 Cravens ave. has been increasingly busy with new registrations for work and applications for unemployment insurance benefits.

The large number of returning war veterans has also increased the number of persons using these public services. Some 3000 unemployed workers are being cleared through this office each week. Employers who need workers should advise the Employment Office of their needs, as many types of workers are now available for employment.

This community, as a whole, is benefiting by the approximately \$200,000 being paid through this office each month to claimants for unemployment insurance benefits and veteran's readjustment allowances.

Many persons are being laid off at the end of each week, and immediately come in on Monday to register for work and file claims for unemployment insurance. This creates congestion and involves waiting and delay. It will be to the advantage of unemployed workers, as well as this office, if they apply for work and unemployment insurance benefits during the middle or latter part of the week, rather than on Monday, which is the busiest day in this office.
