

### Three Veterans Enlist In Co. H Of State Guard

Three veterans of World War II who want to continue their military service have enlisted in Co. H, 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment, California State Guard, recently, according to Capt. R. L. Lewellen, commanding officer.

Wayne A. Morse, who served in the South Pacific in the Army from 1940 to 1945, is one who has become a member of the State Guard. William A. Klarin, who served in the Army for one year, is another. The third is Eugene Beckman, former member of Co. H, both on a reserve and active duty status, who served in the Army for 36 months, 27 months overseas. He was a sergeant.

Another new member is Eugene Erbetta, 17-year-old Torrance High school student who has taken advantage of the training offered in the State Guard.

Captain Lewellen said that men with former military or National Guard service experience now may enlist in the National Guard. Ages are 17 to 45.

The company drills each Monday night at Torrance ball park, and non-commissioned officers schools are held Thursday nights.

Editor Torrance Herald:  
On Friday afternoon February first an unwarranted slugging took place in Torrance. We are familiar with the details.

Hillman Lee as manager of a store was ordered to reopen. If he did not he would lose his job. He opened but hired no employees.

He has taken an active interest in all civic affairs which would benefit Torrance as a whole, from peasants to bankers, from youth recreation to better public buildings and parks. He has treated everyone as an equal, has been friendly to all, always willing to help whenever possible.

Mr. Lee and I, as volunteer Boy Scout officials have often been called upon to help youth and I have found him one of the very few businessmen to find time and support in furthering the interest of the Boy Scout organization.

I know what unionism means. I probably had a union button to play with after I was born. When my dad passed away in 1944 a record of more than 44 years as a member of the International Association of Machinists went with him. My brother, sister and I probably know what it meant to be really hungry and ragged, because when my dad hit the bricks in 1906 there was no paycheck until three years later. I participated in sporadic strikes as a member of the I. W. O. hit the bricks with the Longshoremen in 1934, 1935, 1936 and 1937. I believe in unionism. I believe in mass organization such as the C. I. O. offers but I don't believe that the type of tactics that were used on Hillman Lee and John Melville will do unionism any good. I have asked the opinions of a number of good union men and they feel the same as I do, so I strongly urge all citizens of Torrance whether belonging to or sympathizing with unions, or not, to pledge themselves to contribute to the cause, to bring the perpetrators to the justice they deserve.

I also strongly urge that an investigation be made of the local Police Department to determine why this case remains unsolved, and if a committee is formed, I request that I be appointed chairman.

**FRUIT SALAD DRESSING**  
2 tbs. vinegar  
4 tbs. lemon juice  
2 tbs. Worcestershire sauce  
2 tbs. brown sugar  
1 c. catsup  
1 c. water  
Seasonings  
Cool onion in shortening until golden brown. Add remaining ingredients and simmer 30 minutes. When cool, the sauce may be stored in the refrigerator and used on any desired meat.

**ORANGE BREAD**  
3/4 c. sifted flour  
3 tbs. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 c. sugar  
2 tbs. melted shortening  
1 egg  
1/2 c. chopped walnuts  
1 tbs. grated orange rind  
1/2 c. orange marmalade  
1 c. milk  
Blend sugar and shortening. Add beaten egg, orange rind and marmalade. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Turn into oiled loaf pan that has been lined with waxed paper. Bake at 350° for 1 1/2 hours.

**LEMON-OAKE PUDDING**  
1 tbs. margarine  
1/4 c. sugar  
1 tsp. grated lemon rind  
4 tbs. lemon juice  
2 tbs. flour  
1 c. milk  
1 egg white  
Mix margarine and sugar thoroughly. Add lemon rind and juice. Add beaten egg yolks, flour and milk. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into oiled 8 qt. casserole. Set in a pan of hot water. Bake at 350° for 1 1/2 hours. (May be baked in individual custard cups for 45 to 50 minutes.)

### Capt. Zamperini Featured In Magazine Article

United States Marines were far too busy making beachheads during the war to pay much attention to publicity, but now they have dropped back into peace-time routine adding the glory of World War II heroes to their 160 years of tradition.

The Corps is noted for conservation of praise and when an Army man makes the "Leatherneck," official magazine of the Marines, it is only because he warrants every inch of space given him.

This is exactly what happened when the February issue of the magazine hit the newsstands with a picture-story depicting the homecoming of Captain Louis Zamperini, local Army Air Forces bombardier and survivor of months mistreatment as a Jap prisoner. The story appears on page 9 of the February edition of the Leatherneck magazine. It was written and the pictures taken a few days after the former Olympic track star returned to his home after his long trek back from Japan.

The pictures appearing in the magazine show Louie being greeted at the Long Beach air field by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Zamperini, and sisters Virginia and Sylvia. A second photo was taken during the first family dinner with mother, father, brother Pete and both sisters present. The remaining two photographs show the captain looking at a collection of medals earned during his Torrance high school, University of Southern California and Olympic games days of competition; with the final shot showing both Zamperini brothers looking at their scrap-

book made up of news and sports page clippings recording the activities of both local stars. Pictures and story are by Bob Wilton, who at the time of the coverage was Marine staff sergeant on the Leatherneck magazine staff and just returned from the Pacific. There is one exception to this and that is that the lead picture of Zamperini being greeted by the Torrance Herald City Editor, Frank Selover, who was at the scene on Louie's arrival. Men interested in radio communication in the field will have an opportunity Monday night to witness a demonstration in the operation of latest Army Walkie-Talkie equipment, according to Major Harold F. Thienhaus, commanding officer of the 2nd battalion, 39th regiment, California State Guard.

The demonstration will be conducted at the Long Beach Armory, 854 E. 7th st., starting at 7:30 o'clock, the major said. Specially trained State Guard troops will be dispatched into the field and will receive orders through Walkie-Talkie receivers, make investigations and report back through the sending sets which they will carry.

The 2nd battalion of the State Guard is organizing a communications platoon, the major said, and several openings in non-commissioned officer grades are to be filled. Men who are interested and who can qualify are especially invited to witness the demonstration which will be put under the direction of communications experts attached to the Southern California Area, California State Guard, headquarters in Los Angeles.
