

**KEEP BOOK FOUR, GOVERNMENT SAYS; MAY NEED IT LATER**

Housewives were advised today by the Office of Price Administration to retain in their possession War Ration Book Four, now used only to obtain sugar.

Although the currently valid sugar stamp 39 is the last stamp in War Ration Book Four that is specifically labeled for purchases of sugar, spare stamps in that book will be designated as sugar stamps from time to time. For this reason War Ration Book Four should be retained even after sugar stamp 39 has been used, OPA emphasized.

Sugar stamp 40 was used for the 1944 home canning program.

**Railway Pullman Service Resumed**

Pullman sleeping car service was resumed Feb. 15 between Los Angeles and Sacramento on trains 59 and 60, the "West Coast," and between Los Angeles and Phoenix on the "Golden State Limited." It was announced today by Karl J. Caldwell, district passenger agent.

Announcement also was made of the restoration of the rear parlor-observation car on the streamlined "San Joaquin Daylight" operating between Los Angeles and San Francisco. The parlor car unit was taken off during the war to make room for a standard chair car to provide additional passenger carrying space.

The Pullman service to Sacramento and Phoenix was suspended July 15, 1945, when the Office of Defense Transportation ordered the discontinuance of sleeping cars on runs of 450 miles or less. This move was taken to make more sleeping cars available for troops. The ODT order remains in effect for runs of 350 miles or less.

**PARK WORK DELAYED**

Work on improvements at Lomita Park has been delayed for an indefinite period, reported H. J. Farrington, Los Angeles contractor, who was awarded the contract on his low bid of \$42,735. Farrington listed difficulty in obtaining materials and labor as causing the delay.
