Joshua Hendy Threatens To Quit Sunnyvale

Threats of Joshua Hendy Co. to move its Sunnyvale plant to Torrance because of the machinists' strike are being opposed by San Jose merchants and others, who seek to prevent the loss of a \$12,000,000 annual payroll.

San Jose's City Council, Merchants' Association and Chamber of Commerce urged the International Association of Machinists to intervene in the strike of Lodge 68 at the Hendy plant.

They telegraphed Harvey Brown, president of the I.A.M. in Washington, D. C., informing him that Hendy officials had threatened to move their plant to the south because of the three-month-old strike and urging Brown to attempt to bring about a settlement.

Recently deciding to re-equip and to re-tool the local plant from which they moved less than six months ago, Joshua Hendy announced that a small number of employees have been hired at the Torrance works during the past week with more employees planned for their forthcoming job of general manufacture of heavy metal products.

Arthur F. Freshman, manager, stated yesterday that former employees would be given preference in the hiring and that the plant would soon require several hundred employees for its operation. He said that the company had entered into an agreement with the A. F. of L. International Association of Machinists.

It was indicated that much of the equipment for the local firm is being moved from the Sunnyvale works.

Union Oil Signs New Contract

The Oil Workers International Union at Wilmington announced settlement of a wage dispute with the Union Oil Refinery and have asked the navy to return control of the plant to the company.

Settlement of the wage dispute marked the end of a situation which developed last November and resulted in navy seizure of the plant when the refinery's 1200 employees struck. C. E. Fredericks, secretary, said the union had asked for a 30 percent wage increase, but settlement has been set at 18 percent, which amounts to about 21 cents per hour for each employee.

He said the company also has agreed to pay 4 cents an hour extra to workers on the 4 p. m. to midnight shift and 6 cents to those on the midnight to 8 a. m. shift.

The night-work increase will be retroactive to last Jan. 20, and the new 18 percent increase is to go into effect Mar. 4, Fredericks said.

Other Torrance firms which have signed for the increase of 18 percent include General Petroleum Corp. and Shell Chemical Co., Standard Oil Co., El Segundo, also has signed, as well as Shell and Richfield, both having many employees living in Torrance and vicinity.
