

Lions' First Anniversary Is Observed

With more than 100 Lions club members and their guests present, Torrance Lions club celebrated its first anniversary with a dinner and dance at Palos Verdes Country Club Friday evening.

The club and its officers received the plaudits of District Governor Clyde Martyn and International Counselor Earle Baker for its accomplishments during the year.

Frank S. Selover, managing editor of the Torrance Herald and secretary of the club, read a report of 18 major accomplishments of the organization during its first year of existence. They included Presentation of World War II honor roll to City of Torrance; sponsorship of highway cluster signs' installation at entrances to Torrance for all clubs; accomplishment of slum-clearance legislative program; proposal to Board of Supervisors that they acquire Torrance Army hospital, now being undertaken; sponsorship of Woodcraft Rangers; dedication of beds in Torrance Memorial hospital for cases of an indeterminate nature; co-sponsorship of organization of Tartar Town; co-sponsorship of Torrance Boys club building project; sponsored high school speakers contest; sponsoring tri-service clubs project of Torrance Plan to curb juvenile delinquency; endorsing and spearheading first annual Veterans Welcome and Fourth of July jubilee; sponsoring plan to finance swimming pool in Torrance; co-sponsoring annual New Year's Eve dance in Torrance.

President Harry B. Lewis presided over the meeting which featured professional entertainment and two numbers by talented pupils of Three Arts Studio, and adagio by Cindy and Stevie Hornick and an aerobatic number by Cindy.

125 Members Entered In 'Y' Campaign Here

Gil Derouin, chairman of the Torrance YMCA enrollment, announced that 125 members have joined the "Y" during the opening days of the drive. Nine teams represent industry, business and residential areas. They are contacting the people of Torrance area during this, the first membership enrollment of the local "Y".

On Friday, March 1, a victory dinner, to be held at St. Andrew's Church for all team members, will end this drive for 400 members.

Due to the short period allotted for the membership enrollment, it will be difficult to contact all persons who would like to join as members. Chairman Derouin encourages any interested individual to call the local "Y" and sign up directly.

The team organization of 55 workers is being led by high producer Von Bergen of Felker Manufacturing Company, who has secured 28 members. James Burchett, teacher at Torrance High, is second with 14 members. Rev. Paul M. Wheeler and Louis Sauter have 5. Al Jackson of International Derrick and Equipment Company and John McVicar of Torrance Brass have 7 each.

State Income Tax Examiner In City Soon

Assistance in preparation of state income tax returns will be available at the Torrance City Hall on March 4 and 5, 1946 it was announced today by the franchise tax commissioner's office.

Single persons whose net incomes was over \$3000 and married couples whose combined net income was over \$4500 or in either status if the gross income was over \$5000 are required to file state returns.

Inasmuch as provisions of the California Income Tax Law differ in many respects from those of the Federal Revenue Act, taxpayers having any questions are invited to call on the state representative to have them answered.

It is pointed out that the above dates are the only times when personal assistance will be available in this city and taxpayers are urged to avail themselves of this service in order to justify a representative being assigned here next year. This service is offered without charge.

CAMPAIGN TO FINANCE TORRANCE SWIMMING POOL STARTED BY LIONS, KIDS

Torrance will have a swimming pool if the kids have to finance it themselves, and that is just what they intend to do, under the sponsorship of Torrance Lions club.

At a meeting of the directors of the Lions club Tuesday, the project was outlined and the Lions decided to provide seals which the school students of Torrance will sell, 100 percent of the proceeds going into a fund which will be offered to the City of Torrance to finance the swimming pool.

Already, Principal Raymond J. Casey, of Torrance high school, and Mayor W. H. Tolson, have endorsed the idea, and the same children who showed their spirit by voting 10 to 1 in favor of a swimming pool over a skating rink will be organized to conduct the drive.

No time limit will be placed on the drive, the Lions said, but it is expected that during the balance of the school year, the fund will reach sufficient proportions to figure prominently in the forthcoming bond issue

election in which plans for a recreation building which could house a swimming pool will be included.

Three Lions committees will figure in the campaign, the Boys and Girls work committee, headed by R. I. Plomert Jr., assisted by Charles Gotts and Earl Mallory; the Community Betterment Committee, headed by City Clerk A. H. Bartlett and assisted by L. J. Hallanger and K. E. Bradley, and the Health and Welfare committee, headed by Don C. Moskos, M.

D., and assisted by Rollin R. Smith, D.V.M., and Eddie Thompson. Serving in ex-officio capacity on each committee will be President H. B. Lewis and Secretary Frank S. Selover, it was said.

While the drive is being organized, the Lions already have 100,000 stamps to sell for 10 cents each to start the drive. Torrance Boys club, the Y.M.C.A., Tartar Town, Woodcraft Rangers, the Boy Scouts and other groups are expected to get into the drive, and when teams

are organized, prizes will be provided by the Lions for the winners, President Lewis said. "The kids want a swimming pool, and they'll have it," it was declared, "because they want it had enough to work for it."
