Christian women of 51 countries throughout the world will participate in the traditional observance, which since 1887 has been held on the first Friday of the Lenten season. The observance will first get underway west of the international date line in the Fiji islands and New Zealand, then travel with the sun around the world, winding up on the St. Lawrence island off the coast of Alaska. This year's theme is "The Things That Make for Our Peace."

General Herbert Leaving Post On March 25

Brig. Gen. James K. Herbert, port of embarkation commander here since November, 1943, Friday announced the war department had accepted his resignation and that he would go on terminal leave March 25.

General Herbert plans a long vacation and then expects to become identified with a Pacific coast concern. Born in 1909, he was graduated in 1930 from the U. S. military academy, and in 1932 received an MS degree in engineering from Iowa State college. He and his wife and their children, James T. and Sharon I. live in Long Beach.

General Herbert said he expected the army port to be shut down completely by April 3. Military personnel at the port now is less than 200. Of 1200 civilian employees, 900 will be released within the next week. Torrance Army hospital is a part of the L. A. P. E. installation.

The U. S. district engineer, Col. R. C. Hunter, already has taken jurisdiction over Camp Ross on Figueroa st. and later will take jurisdiction over other army port property.

Ten million dollars worth of boats, ranging from tugs to crane barges, will be turned over to the maritime commission for disposal.
