This column, issued by the Public Relations Department of the Los Angeles Regional Office of the Veterans Administration, is designed to give veterans official answers to their readjustment problems.

"Right Guide" is created to give the veterans official information regarding the application of federal veteran laws directly from the Veterans' Administration.

There is so much confusion, misunderstanding, and second-hand information about these laws G.I.s are developing a bad case of "Peace Fatigue." In addition to the many laws and their varied applications there are 17 agencies and organizations established to help them in their readjustment programs. To the new veteran this readjustment program looks as jumbled and trackless as the jungles in the South Pacific.

This, however, is not the case. Duties are well defined and each of the agencies has a different and distinct part in the veteran readjustment program.

Right Guide will point the way. It will explain Who Handles What and how each application for benefit is properly processed. It will be the official word of the Veterans' Administration. The information will come direct from the firing line. It will come from the downtown office of the V.A. in Los Angeles which handles more than 1500 veterans daily. And, when 1500 veterans start asking questions—you better have the right answers, or else.

Veterans, this is your column. Whatever you want to know about federal legislation, ask Right Guide. If you have a problem—or a gripe—let Right Guide know about it. Every question will be answered. The answers will be official and direct. This column is open to veterans of all wars, peacetime service people, the beneficiaries and dependents of veterans—in other words, all those who are affected by federal veteran legislation. This will not be a "boiler-plate" column. Every question will be an actual problem of some veteran—or dependent. Interspersed with the questions and answers will be interpretations of new laws and decisions from the V.A. Your desires as to the use of your name will be respected and the content of correspondence will be confidential if you so request.

The men and women who serve in the V.A. are veterans themselves. They represent every rank and branch of service. They were in every theater of operation in both World Wars. Some 60 percent wear the Purple Heart and some were decorated for bravery. One received the Congressional Medal of Honor. They served as you served. Their problems are your problems. They will do all they can to help you "above and beyond the call of duty."
