### Schools To Continue Stamp Sales

The thrift practice program, through which more than \$200,000,000 in War Bonds and Stamps were purchased by Southern California school students during the war years, will be continued in the majority of schools in this area as a permanent part of their class room activities.

This announcement was made by Avery J. Gray, educational director of the U. S. Savings Bonds Division of the Treasury Department for Southern California, following a survey of public, private and parochial schools in the 11 southern counties.

"The students of Southern California schools led the nation in the purchase and sale of Bonds and Stamps during the last 18 months of the war," Gray said. "This was a superlative accomplishment, and it is heartening to know that the habit of thrift thus formed by students will not be allowed to lapse in most of the schools."

All children with partially filled stamp albums are being urged to fill them and convert them into bonds. Gray pointed out that U. S. Savings Stamps of the same denominations as War Saving Stamps will remain on sale and that the Savings Bonds are exactly the same as the old War Bonds, bearing the same interest rate.

### Important Post Given In G.P. Expansion Move

In an important organizational move designed to take care of expanding executive duties in his department, Clarence S. Beesmyer, vice president and director of marketing of General Petroleum Corporation, announced today the appointment of V. A. Bellman and Felix Chappellet as his assistants. Both men advanced to the important posts have long records of successful operation with the company.

Bellman, a graduate of the University of Washington, and known nationally as a football player, first joined the company in 1933, and has held numerous important posts in Los Angeles and the Northwest. He became resident manager for General in Washington in 1942, and two years later was transferred to San Francisco to take over management of the key Northern California division. In fact, he is the second generation of his family to work for the company. His father joined General at the time the company was formed, in 1912, and was director of production when he died in 1921.

## GUIDE RIGHT

Fifteen million service men and women took an average of \$9000 apiece of National Service Life Insurance. This represents 135 billion dollars worth of protection for themselves and their dependents. It is complete protection at a cost not available except through the United States government. Commercial insurance companies, through their association of National Underwriters, urge veterans to keep their government policies.

The returning veteran will never buy better protection. There is no way he can invest six to seven dollars a month to better advantage. And yet, more than 60 per cent have allowed their insurance to lapse after separation. Many of these will never again be able to secure any kind of insurance. The reasons why such a high percentage are dropping this valuable opportunity for economic rehabilitation have been under consideration by VA officials for the past few months. After a careful survey the VA has come to the conclusion most veterans drop their insurance because of misunderstanding and misinformation.

Right Guide, in an effort to straighten out the veteran, and to give him the answers to most of his questions about insurance, lists below some simple facts—he should know about NSLI.

The kind of insurance taken out in service is called TERM insurance. This is complete protection at absolute cost. In fact, Congress has appropriated millions of dollars to cover all costs of administration. Every dollar invested in COST insurance is a hundred per cent insurance dollar. The veteran may carry this type—term insurance—for eight years from the date of his original discharge. After those eight years are up he must convert, or change, to one of the three other types available.

The policies are Ordinary life, 30-Payment life, 20-payment life. Under the Ordinary life policy the veteran will pay a smaller monthly premium but he will pay it for life. The 30-Payment life is paid up completely at the end of thirty years, and the 20-payment at the end of twenty years.

Insurance premiums may be deducted from the veteran's retirement pay, pension or disability compensation, if the veteran so desires and notifies the VA.

Premium remittances should be in the form of check, draft, or money-order, made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. The mailing address has been changed from Washington to New York. January Is Third Highest Mo. For Gas Assessments

Reflecting the normal decline of winter months, January, 1946, however, is the third highest month of all time for gasoline tax assessment of California oil companies. This was made known today by the State Board of Equalization, following completion of the January roll, from which an assessment, based on distribution of 194,450,721 gallons, netted \$5,833,521.

This month is exceeded only by December, 1945, by \$63,980 and the all-time high month of September, 1945, following cessation of gasoline rationing, when distribution of 198,204,952 gallons produced the peak revenue of \$5,946,148. Compared to January, 1945, it is a gain of 35 per cent, when distribution of 149,395,984 produced \$4,301,879.
