

Veterans Administration Of State Now On Full Time Basis, Under Law

Legislation "putting the administration of California veteran affairs on a full-time basis" for the first time has been signed by Gov. Earl Warren.

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs is abolished. The Adjutant-General is established as an independent office. A Department of Veterans Affairs, under a full-time director, is created by the new law.

"Veterans affairs cannot be operated on a part-time basis," the Governor said. "We will be ready, when this legislation goes into effect on May 21, to jump in and see that every Act legislated during the last three years gets the maximum amount of attention."

The Department of Veterans Affairs will administer the State's farm and home purchase program for veterans, as well as educational assistance, apprentice training and other laws adopted for the benefit of men and women who served in the armed forces in time of war.

Officials of veterans' organizations who witnessed the signing of the reorganization bill declared California "has a better program for veterans than any other State." The officials included Irvin "Bob" Snyder, state commander of the American Legion, and Richard H. Newhall, state commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Other measures signed by Governor Warren included an \$820,000 appropriation for construction at the Yountville Veterans Home. Warren reduced the appropriation from \$2,235,000, explaining he has had to trim many appropriation bills passed by the Legislature "in order to keep the State out of the red." However, the home receives over \$2,000,000 under the States comprehensive building program totaling \$154,000,000, and the veteran leaders expressed complete satisfaction with the Governor's action.

Court Fines For Two Months Reach \$2670

From Jan. 1, to and including Feb. 28, 1946, the City Court of the City of Torrance received \$2670 net from fines and fees. Of this sum \$1445 are General Fund monies, while \$1223 came from vehicle violations and thus are Road Fund monies.

General Fund monies were collected from the following cases: Drunkenness, \$877; parking, \$144; boulevard stop, \$217 and miscellaneous criminal violations, \$205. Road Fund monies were derived from the following: Speeding, \$400; drunk driving, \$225 and miscellaneous traffic violations, \$385.

Los Angeles Now Fourth Largest City In U.S.A.

Preliminary figures of the special census conducted in the city up to Jan. 28, 1946, give Los Angeles a population of 1,730,000, with the possibility that final figures on Tuesday will raise the total around 30,000 more, Mayor Bowron announced.

This represents an increase of 225,726 in population since the 1940 Federal census of 1,504,277, but is not as much as was anticipated, according to Bowron, who is convinced that a considerable number of persons have not been listed.

The present total makes Los Angeles the fourth largest city in America, as Detroit's last census of 1,623,452 has been passed. New York, Chicago and Philadelphia are the first, second and third.
