Watch Battery; Shortage Seen In This Area

If you want to keep your car running, take care of your battery!

A survey of the battery situation reveals a critical shortage will exist during the next few months and possibly throughout the year.

A world-wide lead shortage is the chief contributing factor to current battery shortages with little improvement expected from either primary or secondary production or from foreign imports in the near future. The curtailment of new car production helped to minimize the shortage, but now that new cars will be rolling off the assembly lines, replacement batteries will be at a premium.

That means your battery will require as much attention as your tires, if you want it to last. Keep it fully charged and see that the generator is working efficiently. Terminals and cables should be greased and free of corrosion. Above all, watch the water level, and have it checked frequently during hot weather.

Construction To Start This Week On 40 New Homes In Waleria Area

Construction is scheduled to begin on 40 homes this week at Torrance exclusively for veterans, by O. E. Goodwin and Earl A. Smythe, general contractor at Wilmington.

Lots have been purchased at Ward, Madison and Park streets, between 238th and 240th sts., in the Waleria area.

Each of the homes will have two bedrooms and has been tentatively approved by the Veterans Administration for sale at \$4,750.

"The homes will be of standard construction with stucco and plaster finish," said Smythe at his office, 1307 Avalon blvd., Wilmington.

"This effort is somewhat of an experiment. Present houses for veterans are fantastic in price, so Goodwin and I determined to see if we could produce a house around \$5,000—well under the \$6,000 figure favored by the Veterans administration. As we are veterans—although I vintage of 1918—we have some understanding of veterans' problems."

The homes will be obtainable on general veterans' terms. Interest will be only 4%. There will be no down payment and monthly payments will approximate \$26 a month. Financing has been arranged by the Standard Federal saving and loan association, of Los Angeles. So far as possible, said Smythe, sales will be limited to veterans and their families in the Torrance and harbor area.

Priorities for the homes have been issued and construction is expected to proceed rapidly.

Boys' Softball Games Sponsored By Lions Club

Torrance Lions club will sponsor the Torrance Recreation Department Junior softball team which will meet a team from Oxnard on April 27, it was decided at the meeting of the organization Tuesday in the Civic Auditorium.

The local group will be organized under the supervision of Dale Riley, superintendent of recreation for the city and a member of the club. He will be assisted by Elmer (Red) Moon, recreation supervisor.

When the Oxnard group comes to Torrance on Saturday, April 27, the two teams will be entertained by the Lions club at a typical baseball tournament luncheon, and the visitors will be shown the sights of the town.

When the Torrance team returns the visit to Oxnard, the Lions will provide transportation and necessary items for the trip, it was decided.

At the meeting of the club Tuesday, Mrs. Virginia Brewster Marlow, former professor of history at U.S.C. and the University of Illinois, spoke on the subject: "Can the United Nations Keep the Peace?" She gave factual data on the situation with respect to the world organization of nations both prior to and following the actual induction of the present organization. She was introduced by Don C. Moshos, M.D., program chairman.

Many Service Men, Women To Be Employed

One hundred and fifty men and women, chiefly ex-service people will be employed by the Salvation Army in Long Beach at 1370 Alamitos ave., when work in the re-conditioning department gets under way soon. This division will be included in new facilities being constructed in a two-story building adjoining property now occupied by the Salvation Army Store.

In addition to work rooms there will be recreation rooms, dining room and kitchen, bringing the local Salvation Army headquarters on a par with such cities as Kansas City, Mo., Oakland, and others of similar population, according to Major Orlo L. Ellison, in charge.

Special opportunities will be offered ex-service men, Major Ellison said. "We are establishing no age limit," he explained. "We are interested especially in the unattached man who may be facing an uncertain future, possibly one whose needs are not met by government agencies already in operation."

'Just Couldn't Keep Out Of Jail,' Says L.A. Woman

Mrs. Mildred Gilbreath, wife of a former Los Angeles police officer, and a resident of that city, just couldn't keep out of the various jails in the county last week, according to local police reports.

Mrs. Gilbreath was arrested here for drunk driving and after a six hour stay in the city jail she was released on bail.

After gaining her freedom she hastened to get out of town and on reaching Inglewood she stopped at a service station for gasoline. Mistake number one.

She says that while her car was being filled with gas she became violently ill. This attracted Inglewood officers who promptly placed her under arrest for drunkenness. After a stay in the Inglewood jail she was finally released under another bond.

Hastening to get out of Inglewood, Mrs. Gilbreath committed mistake number two. She entered Los Angeles City limits and decided to take a nap in her car. The nap was soon disturbed by Los Angeles police who booked her at Lincoln Heights on a "drunk in auto" charge. Several days went by before she was released.

Upon her release she hastened back to Inglewood to pay a fine, then to Torrance where she appeared before City Judge John Shidler who levied a fine of \$100, on her plea of guilty to drunk driving, in addition to suspending her license for 30 days.

Mrs. Gilbreath said that she would not only stay home in the future but would abstain from any use of liquor.

Others paying fines for drunk driving on pleas of guilty in city court are: H. G. Williams, Redondo Beach, \$75; R. C. Stephens, Los Angeles, Bellflower, \$75; J. L. Boyd, Wilmington, \$100.

Drinking while driving is not only an expensive form of negligence, but is dangerous as well, according to Judge Shidler.

Rains Save Most Of Southland's Crops, Forage

The rains came in time to save most of the Southland's crops, especially the seriously menaced hay and forage pasture, but the long dry period had already reduced citrus and avocado sizes and lessened grain yield prospects in dry areas, says the March report of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce Agricultural department.

Farm workers are becoming more readily available, but there is still a shortage of skilled help. Pest control operations have been seriously neglected and the aphids are unusually prevalent.

Shipments of Southern California navel oranges are far ahead of last year, with prices 35c a box over last year and strong demand for all but the smallest sizes. Movements will probably stay close to the present rate until active shipping of the Valencia crop begins in May.

This year's Valencia crop is estimated at 50,000 cars, compared to 76,000 cars last year by the Orange Administrative Committee. Sizes are still very small, but slightly larger than last year's.

Lemon shipments were about the same as 1945 for the same period, with prices 45c a box higher. The crop is now expected to fall considerably below the earlier estimates. Heavy shipments of sub-standard lemons have gone to by-products.

Veterans Offered Education Chance At City College

Los Angeles City College is opening new opportunities for returning servicemen. Veterans who left school before receiving their diplomas will be given a chance to graduate without further schooling.

The Veterans' Educational Counseling Service has devised a series of tests to be given young men being released from service. It has been recommended that a high school should grant a diploma if the veteran meets either of the following requirements: that the examinee makes a standard score of 35 or above on each of the five tests; or that he make an average standard score of 45 or above on the tests.

The five tests will be an examination on correctness and effectiveness of expression, interpretation of reading materials in social studies, natural sciences, literary materials, and general mathematical ability.
