Public Schools Week Observed In Torrance High School Program

A large audience greeted the participants of the "Open House" program which highlighted the observance of Public School Week at Torrance high school.

After a brief greeting by Principal Raymond J. Casey, Leonard Green, co-ordinator of Boys' Activities, who acted as master of ceremonies, presented to the audience a series of eleven stereopticon slides designed to bring to the awareness of the parents and patrons of the school various phases of the high school curriculum. On the slides a complete secondary education was presented graphically in the form of a stout rope made up of inner strands and an outer covering. The four strands composing the inner or "core" part of the rope consisted of the basic subjects, namely, "English, science, mathematics and the social sciences." The outer wrapping of this educational rope of those subjects having cultural and vocational value such as Home Economics, Industrial Arts, Fine Arts, Music, Foreign Language and the speech arts. It was brought out by Mr. Green that the schools have as a prime obligation the aiding of each individual to attain the fullest educational growth consistent with his needs, abilities and interests. As a tribute to the fraternal organization which twenty-seven years ago initiated the idea of a "Public Schools Week," G. A.
