

I immediately brought my car to a halt, but the truck, unable to stop, struck me while I was halted."

The Herald obtained its information from the Torrance Police Department's log, which read: "Mrs. Salm struck side of oil truck. Accident occurred at El Prado and Cabrillo ave. No injuries."

## Local Library Displays Wares From Guatemala

On display in the Torrance Library many interesting items of Guatemalan hand work are exhibited through the courtesy of Miss Betsy Byrnes who only recently returned from a visit in Central America.

Miss Byrnes, whose parents were among the first settlers of Torrance, has captured, through her collections, the very spirit and customs of the natives of that region. Perhaps one of the most interesting items she purchased there, which puzzled the natives, is a mecapal.

A mecapal is a head-band of ox hide, worn hairy-side next to the head, to which ropes are connected to support the heavy loads the Guatemala natives carry on their backs. Miss Byrnes explained when the native had carried his load to its destination, he would load up with rocks on the return trip just to stay in condition.

Other articles displayed in the collection, which will remain in the library for perhaps a month, are Indian footwear, musical instruments, necklaces worn by Coban Indian women, who are far into the back country where Miss Byrnes spent nearly a month, and a mask of Tecum which represents the early martyred King of that country.
